Woodrow Wilson

In 1909 Wilson said: "There is another as formidable an enemy to equality and opportunity as the capitalist, the labor organization and leader—quite as monopolistic in spirit as the capitalist, and quite as apt to corrupt and ruin our industry by the monopoly."

The above statement of Mr. Wilson is not a campaign document. It is an extract from a baccalaureate address to a graduating class at Princeton on June 13th, 1909, and is a matter of record. What respect can labor have for a man who will speak in such terms?

William H. Taft

Prior to 1908 President Taft was known as "Injunction Judge" Taft, and Samuel Gompers has pointed out that the attitude of the president is as unfair as was that of "Injunction Judge" Taft.

Theodore Roosevelt

As president he approved these measures—
Creating the Department of Commerce and Labor and making its head a cabinet officer.
Improving the act relating to safety appliances on railroad trains.
Making wages preferred claims.
For inspection of boilers.
Securing the wages of employes on public work.

As a Progressive candidate he believes—
No wage earner, man, woman or child shall be compelled to work seven days a week.
Pensions shall be paid workmen in case of sickness, irregular employment and old age.
The organization of the workers—both men and women—shall be encouraged.
Injunctions shall not be permitted during strikes if such injunctions would not apply in case there were no strike.
