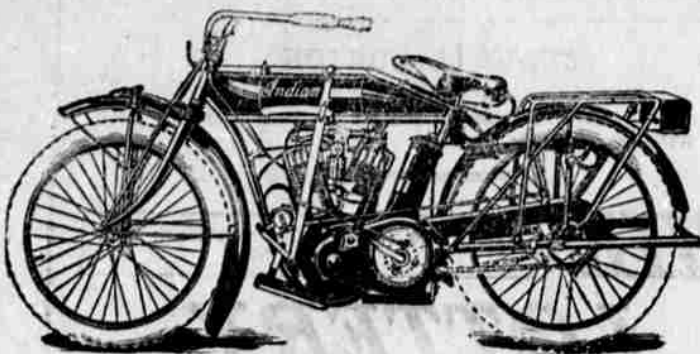


1913 MODELS OF THE INDIAN MOTORCYCLE



Following the "14 important improvements" of the 1912 the Hendee Mfg. company announce no less than a dozen additional new features in their 1913 model of the Indian Motorcycle.

By far the most significant feature of the new machine is the Cradle Spring Frame. It is something entirely new, a radical departure from the conventional bicycle and recent motorcycle system of "springing." Briefly, the new device consists of the application to the rear wheel of the Indian Cradle Spring device as used on the front fork for the past three years.

Extending back horizontally from the frame joint cluster under the saddle, flanking the rear mud guard, are two 7-leaf Chrome Vanadium steel springs. The "C" shaped curls at the rear end of these springs are connected by stays to bell-cranks on which the rear axle is hung. The forward end of the rear fork has a hinge joint which enables the rear wheel to yield to imperfections of road surface. All shocks are completely absorbed by the leaf springs. The rear wheel can go through almost any vertical motion with-

out affecting the body of the machine. There is no "bottom" to this spring device. The life of the machine is greatly increased.

The Engineering Department of the Hendee Mfg. Co. devoted 18 months of exhaustive test to the Cradle Spring Frame before finally deciding on its adoption for all models of the 1913 Indian.

In addition to the cradle Spring Frame, the 1913 Indian embodies 10 other important improvements which will be appreciated by motorcycle riders in general. Prices remain the same as last year.

New style single clinch rims; larger tires, wider mud guards front and rear with larger splashers; casing for upper stretch of transmission chain and curve of sprocket; larger luggage carrier in rear, fitted to all models; foot rests, as well as pedals, fitted to regular 4 h. p. and 7 h. p. models; foot brake lever fitted on left side now operates band brake as well as the pedal action; larger size multiple disc clutch now fitted to all models alike; improved Indian type saddle.

All 1913 Indians will be chain driven and finished in Indian red only.

COOK CLAIMS ARE SPECIFIC

ACTUALLY DID REACH POLE IN CLAIM.

Interesting Statements About Dr. Cook Rejected.

Literature received by the La Grande Chautauqua directors as to the veracity of Frederick A. Cook's claims, make interesting reading. Mr. Cook comes to La Grande for an interesting lecture this month and this is what some of the literature about him says:

Peary has published his book and made his charges against Dr. Cook. Claiming the North Pole, Mr. Peary has never made public an iota of the claim.

Mr. Peary's claim has never been proven.

The National Geographic society of Washington award a medal to Mr. Peary as the discoverer of the North Pole. During the congressional investigation last winter, two members of this society testified that in the Peary "proofs" here was no proof. This was suppressed by the newspapers. Mr. Peary himself testified that, although he had them, no tests what- ever had been made of his instruments by his friends of the Geographic society, who gave their pre-arrange verdict.

Dr. Cook now makes public for the first time the basis of his Polar claim, and replies "in toto" to Mr. Peary.

Dr. Cook presents in his lectures and book, which has just been published, the scientific observations which convinced him that he reached the Pole.

Dr. Cook's claim has never been discredited.

Dr. Cook's report was not rejected by the University of Copenhagen, as the pro-Peary newspaper have stated. The authorities of the university took the attitude that in such data there could be no ultimate.

Dr. Cook's instruments had been left in the North, and could not, therefore, be sent to the University of Copenhagen. Their verdict was "unproven." It did not carry the interpretation that the Pole had not been reached.

The two cases, therefore, are parallel in the re-examination of verdicts except that the Washington verdict was dishonest and the Copenhagen verdict was honest.

Dr. Cook's claim is supported by Rear-Admiral W. S. Schley, General A. W. Greeley, Capt. Roald Amundsen, Capt. Evelyn B. Baldwin, and many of the world's greatest explorers.

Dr. Cook maintains that the only proof of such a quest must be found in the explorer's narrative account, once for the first time.

This is now told to an American audience in his lecture Dr. Cook tells a fascinating story of life in the Arctic and the strange people who inhabit the cold world of the Aurora; of Eskimo love-making, with a temperature far below zero; of the natives' marriage customs, and the coming of the storm among them.

Dr. Cook tells a story of hardships such as few men ever endured and lived. People thrill with his account of hazardous Arctic hunting, of his mad dash over frozen Greenland mountains during the long Arctic night, and of the perilous moonlight quest of walrus on the frozen Arctic Sea.

ELECTORAL VOTE

the House in 1901, and the complication which then arose resulted in the twelfth amendment to the Constitution, which covers the contingency which many persons think may again arise as a result of today's election. It provides that the electoral college shall meet and ballot in their respective states; that they shall prepare lists showing how they have voted, which shall be transmitted to the Federal capitol and opened in a session of the two Houses of Congress by the President of the senate; that the votes shall then be counted; that the person having the greatest number of electoral votes, if it be a majority, shall be President, and that if there be no such person the voting shall take place in the House of Representatives and by states.

States Equally Divided.

Then comes the interesting possibility that the House may not be able to elect. The states in the House are equally divided politically, although the present congress is democratic by numbers. In twenty-two states the majority of the delegation is Republican and in an equal number of the states the majority is Democratic. Then there are four states where the delegation is equally divided, and in-

asmuch as each state is entitled to one vote only, no votes could be cast in these four states. This situation would make it impossible for the House to elect unless there should be a combination between the Taft men and the Democrats, on the one hand, or the Roosevelt men and the Democrats on the other.

If the House remained tied there would be no election. The Senate would choose a vice-president, and he would act as President. As the senate stands there are 49 Republican senators, 44 Democratic senators, and three vacancies, one each in Colorado, Illinois and Idaho. The vacancies will probably be filled by state legislatures soon after the first of the year. If the Republicans managed to keep their majority the situation would be as interesting or more so than if the body were evenly divided. Under the constitution the senate must choose between the two candidates for vice-president receiving the highest number of votes in the electoral college.

On the surface of things the Republicans, having a majority, would re-elect Sherman's successor to succeed Taft. But the Republican control is only nominal, for among the Republican senators are several who have declared for Roosevelt and John son, and would not, it is believed, vote for Sherman's successor or Marshall unless compelled by a majority, under a rule requiring that every senator present shall vote on every roll call, to declare for one or the other.
