## TURKEY NOW A MINUS QUANTITY

### THANKSGIVING BIRD IS A SCARCE ARTICLE.

No Price Can Be Placed on Thanksgiving Turkeys.

Owing to the scarcity of turkeys in Oregon the quotation on the Thanksgiving bird is very much undecided. It will be necessary to ship from Idaho and Washington to supply local demand. This may cause a slight rise in price over last year, but nevertheless the turkey is something we must have for Thanksgiving, regardless of prices. Quotations on other commodities are unchanged and are as follows:
