

EASTERN WAR TITLES QUEER

INTERESTING ALIGNMENT OF
CUSTOMS.

Turkish Titles Are Affixed, Not Used
Prefixes.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—An attaché of the Turkish embassy here offers the following information concerning Ottoman titles to aid American readers in digesting the news from the seat of war in the East. To begin with, it must be understood that all American prefixes, such as Mr., General, Governor, etc., become affixed in Turkey, the title following the name of the individual instead of preceding it.

A Caliph ranks next to the sultan, being a prince of the royal line, with the added distinction of being "Mahomet's representative."

Next, in the Turkish religion, comes Chek-ul-Islam, or the head of the Mahometan faith.

Imam is the title by which a priest is commonly addressed.

Pasha is the highest title within the gift of the sultan. It is bestowed chiefly upon men who attain distinction in the arts or commerce.

The word Bey affixed to a Turkish surname signifies that the wearer is distinguished in the service of the state.

The term Effendi implies that the man so addressed is superior to the average man in birth, breeding and education, although not of the same high rank as a Bey.

The grand vizier, or Saderazam, is the premier of the cabinet and the highest of the government civil officials.

The governor of a province is addressed as Vali, while the mayor of a city affixes to his name Bedelli Raial.

WILSON WINS

tive Cannon privately expressed his opinion today that he did not expect to be beaten, and would be returned to congress by a majority of from 100 to 200. The official canvass is necessary to decide the election in this district.

Total Strength 399 Votes.

Concord, Nov. 6.—Wilson carried New Hampshire by a small margin, making an electoral vote of 399, and Roosevelt 112, Taft 20.

Copeland Is Cheerful.

Oyster Bay, Nov. 6.—The defeat was noticeable in Roosevelt's manner, although he made an encouraged showing to Progressives.

Taft to Practice Law.

Cincinnati, Nov. 6.—Taft arose at eight, apparently in fine spirits. He said he was glad as his retirement will give him a chance to live among his fellow townsmen, and he will re-enter the practice of law in Cincinnati at the expiration of his term. He left this afternoon for Washington.

South Dakota Close.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 6.—Progressives claim they carried South Dakota by 5,000. Republicans claim that Byrne was elected governor and the Democrats claim the election of Johnson.

Hill Is Optimistic.

New York, Nov. 6.—James J. Hill declared today: "I feel better over the general outlook than I did before the election. An attempt was made to bring about a political revolution, but the American people repudiated the effort."

R. I. Republican Governor.

Providence, Nov. 6.—The returns up to nine o'clock indicated that Wilson has carried Rhode Island by 45,000. Pothier, Republican, was re-elected governor by 7,000.

Colorado Storm-Swept.

Denver, Col., Nov. 6.—Returns up to eight o'clock indicated that Wilson swept the state by 25,000. Ammons, Democrat, for governor, is about the same.

Roosevelt Leads Michigan.

Detroit, Nov. 6.—Roosevelt continues to hold a 40,000 plurality. Taft

is a poor third, and Musselman, Republican, for governor, is gaining.

Ohio Margin Big.

Columbus, O., Nov. 6.—At noon the Democratic state chairman, Finley, estimated Wilson's plurality over Taft in Ohio to be between 125,000 and 150,000.

Roosevelt Captures Kansas.

Topeka, Kas., Nov. 6.—Returns this afternoon show that Roosevelt has captured the state. Governor Stubbs, Republican, goes to the senate.

Suffrage In Doubt.

Detroit, Nov. 6.—The state vote on suffrage, at the latest count, is: For, 51,916, against 52,153.

Wisconsin Rejects Suffrage.

New York, Nov. 6.—Advocates of woman suffrage are rejoicing in the addition of four states to its ranks. Wisconsin is the only state rejecting it.

QUEER OLD MINES

The Orpiment Workings In the
Snow Clad Himalayas.

A DAZZLING BLAZE OF COLOR.

Splendors of the Dismal Mineral Pits as They Sparkle in a Brilliant Mosaic of Gold and Rubies in the Light of the Flashing Torches.

High on the flanks of Tihir Mir, one of the snow clad giant Himalayas of Chitral, are the old mines where orpiment is found. Orpiment is a flaky, flexible mineral, a compound of arsenic and sulphur, the basis of certain beautiful yellow pigments, the auripigmentum of the ancients. In "Sport and Life in the Farther Himalayas" Major Kennion describes his visit to these workings, the first visit to them, he was told, ever made by a European:

"The holes through which the mines are entered are in the face of a precipitous rock and are reached by a narrow, downward sloping ledge. They were about large enough for a hyena to walk into without inconvenience.

"On my arrival five or six men with bloodshot eyes and faces covered with yellow dust crawled out. Although not injurious to health, the orpiment, I was told, affected the hands of the miners in a peculiar way. That was obvious enough. The hands of many of the men I saw were shrunken to the bone, of a dark slaty color and covered with knots and excrescences.

"I told my guide to lead on, and he disappeared into one of the holes. I followed more deliberately, surprised at being able to get in at all. After crawling a few yards we found ourselves in a small chamber about eighteen feet long, in which a man could stand upright. The air was fresher than I had expected, but there was no orpiment in sight.

"In the farther corner there was what looked like a well, and toward this my guide led me. Following his example, I sat on the floor and let myself down feet foremost into this dark and narrow hole. The shaft did not go straight down, and on the whole it was easier to descend than a factory chimney, for here and there were projecting ledges on which you could rest your toes. But for any one except a sweep or an orpiment miner it was difficult enough.

"After descending some twenty feet I felt my legs swinging in space, a hand grasped one foot, guided it to a rock and I let myself down on solid earth. I was in another chamber, smaller than the first and stiffer. But still there was no orpiment.

"A hole appeared to be

downward direction from the farther end of the chamber, and on one side a lot of debris had fallen. My guide cheerfully told me that this was the grave of eight men, who had been buried under this fall of stone while working at the end of the passage.

"My guide now disappeared into the hole and I had to follow. There was no room to crawl—you had to lie down and work yourself along with your toes. The air was foul and full of sulphurous dust. If it had been possible to turn round and retreat I think I should have done so. After traversing forty feet which seemed as many miles, in this painful manner we reached another chamber, in which it was possible to sit up.

"Here at last was the orpiment, and it was almost worth the trouble of coming to see. Except where the roof was blackened by our torches—the miners do their work in the dark for the sake of purer air—the walls of the mine seemed a dazzling scintillating mosaic of gold and rubies. The light was thrown back from an infinite number of glittering points, in which every shade of red and yellow, from the deepest ruby to the most brilliant scarlet, from old gold to the palest sulphur, was intermingled to form an indescribable blaze of color.

"After admiring the fascinating glitter and gleam and ever changing blaze of beautiful color of this display of subterranean splendor for awhile and breaking off a few specimens of various hues I began to long for the upper air. So we began the ascent from Avonus, which I was pleased to find considerably easier than the descent."

Ex-Senator Wilson Dead.

Seattle, Nov. 6.—Former Sen. J. L. Wilson, owner of the Post-Intelli-

gencer, died suddenly in a Washington hotel, according to a message to his paper, of heart disease. He spent election day at Washington, preparing to visit the Panama canal when he succumbed. He has long been a Republican leader in his state. He went to the senate in 1895, and served in the Fifty-first, Fifty-second and Fifty-third congress as congressman.
