

CANVASSERS NOW WORKING

OFFICIAL COUNT READY TOMORROW.

Union First County in This Section to Count Officially.

Union county's board of canvassers will complete its official count of ballots cast in this county last Tuesday sometime tomorrow forenoon— ahead of the gathering of ballot boxes in many other counties. So far as can be learned today, Union county presented the first complete count yesterday of any county in all of Eastern Oregon and a great portion of Southern Oregon. Central portions of the state will not be totaled until tomorrow.

The members of the board here are County Clerk Ed. Wright, Justice of the Peace A. C. Williams and Justice of the Peace W. A. Maxwell.

BENHAM CHIEF OF DEPARTMENT

ASSISTANT IS CLARENCE GARRITY, THIS CITY.

Exact Situation of Fire Chief of Volunteers Is Unclear.

W. A. Benham is chief of the La Grande fire department and Clarence Garrity is his assistant. While the ordinance creating the new paid fire department makes that chief of that department supreme, it fails to explicitly indicate what happens to be the chief of the volunteer fire department which is retained intact under the new arrangement. The council at its regular first-of-the-month session this week elected Benham chief and he will take up his domicile in the station as soon as the system is inaugurated, and with the assistance of Clarence Garrity will be in close attendance at the station. Neither man can leave except for meals, sleeping and making their home at the station. The auto fire car cannot be said to have been put to its greatest use until the fire alarm system is completed which will not be for some little time yet. The apartments for the fire company officials and the volunteer department members who will sleep at the station are not quite complete, either.

New Grain Tariff in Effect.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 8.—The Canadian Pacific Railway today put into effect its new tariff on grain shipments from points in western Canada to Duluth and Minneapolis. In the belief of railway officials and shippers the new tariff will result in large shipments of grain in bond being made during the remainder of the season from Alberta and Saskatchewan points to Duluth and Minneapolis.

A. C. Williams is re-elected justice of the peace by an overwhelming majority and M. I. Faulk as constable for this district, again by a safe margin.

SHAKEUP IN TEAM AN AID

BELIEVED DEFENSIVE POWER IS GREATER.

Line Weakened on Offense to Strengthen the General Defense.

With her players re-arranged from a general shakedown, the La Grande high school football team is in Baker today. The most of the members left on the fast mail, and Coach Caylor waited for No. 6 to get Snider and Garrity, they having overslept this morning.

The shakedown places a great deal of attention to a secondary defense, and it is doubtful if Baker can penetrate it. Bohnenkamp goes to center on defense and Winters to tackle. Conkey goes out to take Snider's place at tackle and Snider goes to Kiddle's half back position, and Kiddle and Andrews will handle the guard position left open by Conkey's change. On the offense, Snider, Hunter, Ralston and Bohnenkamp will carry the ball. The safety has been called up to the line and with the full back and center will form a close secondary defense which probably can not be penetrated.

Few rooters accompanied the team, but Coach Caylor had fond hopes of trimming the strong Baker team. While the front wall has been weakened, it is believed the change has worked for the better, and the only problem which he confronted today was to get the line to hold long enough to get the plays away from behind. In any event the team is arranged to stop almost any attack.

The returns from the game will be posted at Y. M. C. A. headquarters as soon as they arrive this evening, about 5 o'clock.

TAFT SECOND IN UMATILLA

PHELPS IS RE-ELECTED JUDGE WITHOUT OPPOSITION.

Thirty-Four Out of 43 Precincts Are Counted in That County.

Pendleton, Ore., Nov. 8.—The East Oregonian said last night: With the complete returns from 34 out of the 43 precincts of Umatilla county it is shown clearly that Wilson wins in this county, with Taft second and Roosevelt a poor third. Seiling leads Lane by 288 votes and equal suffrage has a 200 lead.

The following is a summary of the complete count from 34 precincts out of the 43, showing the vote in the important contests:

For circuit judge, G. W. Phelps was re-elected without opposition, there being no candidate whatsoever against him. The same was true of Frederick Steiwer, republican nominee for district attorney. R. N. Stanfield had no difficulty defeating his Socialist opponent for joint representative. Sheriff Taylor also had a walkaway in his race though his Prohibition opponent George Propeck drew many votes.

Frank Saling was easily re-elected county clerk over R. E. Pery, Socialist candidate. B. S. Burroughs, county recorder, was also re-elected his only opponent being a Socialist nominee. I. E. Young of Milton, Republican nominee for school superintendent, was elected, his only opponent being the Prohibition nominee, I. B. Sevy. Goary Kimbrell, county surveyor, will hold that office another term, having easily won out against his Socialist opponent, U. N. Miller.

The Baker Count.

Baker, Nov. 8.—(Special)—With all precincts included in the count, with the exception of Pine 1 and Pine 2, Richland and City No. 2, the pluralities shown by the leaders in the first report remain in the same ratio, having increased proportionately as the returns slowly came in. The only instance where there has been much doubt was the race for assessor between Jesse L. Dodson and Harry Hyde. The latter was well in the lead at first but Dodson was pressing him close at the end of the first 24 hours' count. Hyde, however, made good gains yesterday and his probable plurality will be around 200.

The almost final count shows the early indicated pluralities for state officials in this county are in about the same proportions, and the final count will without question show pluralities for Wilson, Lane, Graham, Anderson, Godwin, Mitchell, Rand, Combs, Welch, West, Hyde, Palmer, J. F. Smith. The pluralities for county offices computed from the complete returns available without the complete count of the five precincts mentioned above are as follows: Anderson 230, Godwin 364, Hyde 217, Combs 260, J. F. Smith 25, Rand 550, Palmer 428.

County Clerk Combs and deputies will begin work this morning making the official count, and it is anticipated that all the ballot boxes will be in by today. No. 2 precinct in the city, the last to complete the count, finished last evening. It is probable that it will take two days to make the official count.

Miss Snyder seemed to be fond of both the young men and, not until after she had married J. B. Sneed, did she discover that she was really in love with Boyce. She did not have the strength of character to resist the impulses of her heart, and, soon after her marriage to Sneed she began to have secret meetings with Boyce, which became more frequent after the Sneys took up their residence at Amarillo, where Al Boyce, Jr. lived.

On the night of October 13, 1911, Mrs. Sneed informed her husband that she loved Al Boyce and would not live with him any longer. Sneed who was devoted to his beautiful wife, became furious and would have killed his wife and himself had not one of his little children come into the room at the time. On the following day, however, he had her taken to a private sanitarium for insane people, at Arlington Heights, near Fort Worth. A few weeks later Mrs. Sneed managed to send a letter to Al Boyce, her lover, begging him to release her from her prison.

Al Boyce drew a large sum of money and went to Fort Worth, bribed one of the attendants of the sanitarium and through him secured the release of Mrs. Sneed. Boyce and Mrs. Sneed eloped to the north, going first to St. Louis and then to Omaha. At Omaha, Boyce learned that Sneed was in hot pursuit and without delay he fled with Mrs. Sneed to Chicago and thence to Winnipeg, Man. There they were arrested as undesirables on December 26, 1911, and when Sneed reached Winnipeg, having been informed of the arrest, Boyce fled. Sneed took his wife back to Texas and again placed her in the same sanitarium from which she had escaped.

In some manner Sneed learned that Capt. A. C. Boyce, the father of Al Boyce, was in full sympathy with his son and was plotting to get Mrs. Sneed out of the sanitarium. Young Boyce had been indicted on the charge of abduction, but his father brought about the dismissal of the indictments which fact also greatly emboldened Sneed against him. The two men met in the lobby of a hotel in this city on January 13 of this year and, after an

exchange of a few words, J. Beal Sneed drew his pistol and fired several shots at the old man killing him instantly.

Sneed was arrested and tried, but after being out 112 hours the jury returned and reported that no agreement could be reached. A new trial was ordered and this will come up next week. Sneed kept himself in retirement after the mistrial and few persons knew definitely of his whereabouts. Al Boyce, the lover of Mrs. Sneed, was supposed to be in British Columbia and it was reported that he had purchased a ranch there and intended to live there.

On September 14 of this year Sneed and Al Boyce met in one of the principal streets of Amarillo, Texas. Sneed, who, according to the statement of certain witnesses, was disguised as a tramp, approached the unsuspecting Boyce and killed him by several shots from an automatic shotgun. The murderer surrendered and was later indicted, but the trial has not yet been set for a hearing. Sneed will be represented at the coming trial by some of the best legal talent in the state and is confident of his acquittal after the jury shall have learned the full extent of his grievances against Al Boyce and the father of the latter.

FIGHTER IS PENITENT.

Mother Provides Big Bond for His Appearance in Slave Case.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Jack Johnson, the fighter appeared before Federal Judge Landis this morning for approval of a \$30,000 bond in the white slavery case. The bonds were furnished by his mother. The fighter sobbed.
