Contest Millionaire's Will

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 11.—The contest over the will of Frank E. Holyoke, involving an estate estimated at \$1,000,000 and with ramifications extending from Maine to California, came up in court today for trial. The present trial, which follows a similar legal battle already in the courts of Maine, was brought by a son of the deceased millionaire, Rev. Sydney Holyoke, whose home is in Milwaukee.

Frank H. Holyoke was a wealthy lumberman of Bangor, Maine. He came to California for his health and died at Pasadena a year ago last October. In his will he cut off the widow with \$1000 and gave each of his two sons \$100. Both sons had had little to do with their father for several years. When he made his will, the lumberman charged his sons with lack of filial devotion and justified his treatment of his wife by the statement that he had already effected a settlement with her under the terms of which she was to receive certain property in satisfaction of all claims against his estate. The entire estate, with the exception of \$50,000 bequeathed to Bangor philanthropists, was left to two nieces, Madeline and Marjorie Holyoke of Bangor.

In his notice of contest, the Rev. Sydney A. Holyoke alleges that the will was not signed by his father, and that it was drafted by "certain designing persons residing at Pasadena" while his father was mentally unbalanced.

by the present administration will be pigeonholed and die automatically on March 4. In the meanwhile Richey will continue to hold office until March 4th, and about 'steen days thereafter wake up to find his political head lopped off by a Democratic

administration; that a Democrat will be appointed is considered reasonably sure. Who that Democrat will be is another unsafe bet but one man that at present seems to have the clutch in high speed and bitulithic courses to race over is E. E. Bragg, present county school superintendent. He has the endorsement of the county and state central committees which means that of course Will R. King, Democratic national committeeman from Oregon with a very distinct voice close to the Wilson's attentive ear, will endorse Bragg to the senior senator, George E. Chamberlain, which means in turn the Democratic colleague, Harry Lane, will acquiesce, which means above all the senate will ratify. Hence the prospect before Bragg or any Democrat that the Democrats agree upon is much more smooth and less best with political whirlpools than beset the course of any Republican who aspires to the position.

Parenthetically, it might be stated that there are a dozen or so similar

plums hanging by similarly slender threads and by reason of the Bourne-Taft discord may go automatically to Democrats when Republicans could as well grab them. They, like the La Grande job, are unsafe bets. The register and receivership at The Dalles, one at Lakeview, the Union, Salem postmasterships, the United States marshal and many other good positions are in a like predicament, except that appointments for these can be made and ratified in December while the local postoffice can not.
