BIBLE AUTHORSHIP THEME

ARCHDEACON OFFERS FIVE STRIKING PROOFS.

Services Evening and Day Draw Interest to Episcopal Mission.

The archdeacon at St. Peter's church last night warmed the hearts of his audience as he proved himself the doughty champion of the Bible "being the Word of God." He set forth five points in proof:

1. Its effect in obedient lives.
2. Its evident authorship—impossible for it to be either due to fallen human beings or devil inspired.
3. Its wonderful unity.
4. Its prophecies and their fulfillment.
5. Its ever beckoning the Christian to higher and yet higher things.

He elaborated these points and exemplified them with telling illustrations and held the rapt attention of the congregation. This constituted the prelude to the sermon proper which was based on the text: "I have loved thee with an everlasting love." In the morning he gave a most touching address on the "Mystery of human suffering," which brought tears to the eyes even of the unemotional. This morning he spoke on the "Sevenfold spiritual meaning of the book of Genesis." Tonight his preliminary instruction will be on God and the Trinity, and the sermon on "The Deity of Christ as Seen in His Works." Dr. Webber-Thompson is proving himself the children's preacher, as shown by their good attendance and interested expressions as they listen to him. His visits to the schools have been much appreciated and the teachers report that the children are very much taken with him. He shows great indication of possessing many of the gifts of his brilliant uncle, the archdeacon, and those who have met him here will watch his future career with interest and expectation. A great treat is in store Friday night as the archdeacon will give his noted lecture on the passion play. At its last two decennial presentations he was there and he has the faculty of vividly bringing the sublime drama before the mental vision of his hearers.

New Head for Canadian Bankers.
Toronto, Ont., Nov. 14.—Representative bankers and financiers from all parts of the dominion were present today at the opening of the annual convention of the Canadian Bankers' association. Interest in the meeting centers largely in the choice of a successor to Sir Edward Clouston, Bart., who has announced his desire to retire from the presidency of the association. D. R. Wilkie, the president of the Imperial Bank of Canada, appears to be the strongest possibility for the office.

Southern College Conference.
Spartanburg, S. C., Nov. 14.—The heads of many of the leading colleges and academies of the south met in conference here today to discuss the question of uniform college entrance requirements and other matters of mutual interest. The conference will conclude its sessions tomorrow.
