

# POOR GRADES DISAPPEARING

## PLENTY OF MOVEMENT IN AP- PLES SEEN.

### Experts Foresee Speedy Settlement to High Grade Stuff.

Relative to the prospects of the apple market in and about Portland, a Portland dispatch says:

The movement of apples out of dealers' hands continues on a fairly heavy scale, and as for some time past the traffic is largely in the medium grades, which sell at 75 cents to \$1 a box, but receipts from the country are still so liberal as to keep the market more or less top-heavy and prices down. Dealers figure that within the next few weeks most of the poor stock will have been disposed of, and that the market on the better grades then may improve to some extent.

Dave Clarke is getting out a shipment of cherries today for San Francisco. The shipment consists of 230 barrels. Last week he shipped 300 barrels and the total shipments of this particular kind of cherry from the Cove country this season has been twelve carloads, six of which went to San Francisco and six to the east. In describing the cherries Dave says they are especially adapted for "cocktail" purposes which means that hundreds of thousands of cocktails served in the aristocratic cafes will have a Cove cherry in the bottom of the glass.
