HODGIN WILL CONTEST VOTES

MATERIAL CHANGES ARE EXPECTED BY HIM.

Immediate Action on Contest in Both Counties.

Announcement was made Wednesday morning by John Hodgkin of La Grande that he would contest the result of the election, and call for a new count of the votes in both Wallowa and Union counties, says the Wallowa Sun. The Sun continues:

Mr. Hodgkin was the Democratic nominee for joint senator from the two counties, running against Ed E. Kiddle of Island City, who was the Republican nominee. The official result as shown by the canvas of the vote in both counties, gives Kiddle a majority of four votes, and Mr. Hodgkin believes that a new count will make a material change in the vote.

Mr. Hodgkin refused to state the grounds upon which he would ask for a recount, stating to a representative of the Sun that he did not care to make public the details until the charges were filed. "I expect to take the matter up immediately," he said "but until that time, I do not care to go into the details."

Mr. Kiddle at Island City is not worrying over the outcome. An official count of the vote has already given him the election, and there is no reason to believe that a second count would change it.

Retail Merchants in Session.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 19.—With a square deal for the small retail merchant as their slogan, one thousand representatives of the retail trade throughout the country assembled at the Planters' hotel in this city today for the first annual convention of the National Federation of Retail Merchants. The retailers object to having the blame for the high cost of living laid at their doors and the convention will probably register a strong protest. Martin J. Maloney of Detroit is presiding over the convention sessions, which will continue three days. Senator Jonathan Bourne Jr., of Oregon, father of the parcels post, is scheduled to discuss that subject before the convention. Another prominent speaker on the program is Charles Nagel, secretary of commerce and labor, who is to talk about the amendments to the Sherman anti-trust law.
