

MARYLAND'S SENIOR SOLON PASSES TODAY

DEATH EXPECTED HOWEVER,
FOLLOWING LONG ILLNESS

One of Maryland's Best Known Men of Public Affairs Dies This Morning Death Being Expected—Was Attorney General, in Legislature, in Congress Several Terms.

DEATH CAUSE DEADLOCK
Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—The death of Raynor changes control of the senate vote. The Democrats had 49, one above a majority with Raynor, but it is believed that Governor Goldsborough will appoint P. Jackson to the vacancy.
Senator Curtis of Kansas says the election of one and possibly two democrats in Illinois, and one in Tennessee, will probably break the senate deadlock.

Baltimore, Nov. 25.—Isidor Raynor, United States senator from Maryland died this morning at 6:20 o'clock. His death was expected as the senator has been ailing critically for some time.

Isidor Raynor, Democrat, of Baltimore, was born in that city April 1, 1850, was educated at the University of Maryland, and in the University of Virginia. At the latter place he took the academic and law courses, and upon his return to Baltimore was admitted to the bar in 1870, and had been practicing law in that city since that time. He has held the following public offices:

In 1878 he was elected to the Maryland legislature for three years and served on the judiciary committee and was chairman of the Baltimore city delegation; in 1885 he was elected to the state senate for four years, serving on the judiciary committee. He resigned his post in the state senate in the middle of his term and became the Democratic candidate for congress. In 1886 he was elected to the 50th congress, and served on the committee on foreign affairs, interstate and foreign commerce; he was again elected to the 52nd congress, serving on the committees of foreign affairs, coinage, weights and measures, and was re-elected to the 53rd congress, and served on the same committees. He declined a re-election for a fourth term and was elected attorney-general of Maryland, serving from 1899 to 1903. In 1904 he was elected to the United States senate to succeed Honorable Louis B. McComas, Republican, his term beginning March 4, 1905. His term of office expired in 1911 and he was re-elected in 1912, but death prevented his taking seat next March.

Wilson Mourns Raynor.
Hamilton, Bermuda, Nov. 25.—Woodrow Wilson made this statement today: "I deeply regret Raynor's death. The country loses an able, patriotic servant. It will be difficult to replace him."

"Old Glory" Horse Sale Opens.

New York, Nov. 25.—Lovers and breeders of fine horses from widely separated parts of the country thronged Madison Square Garden this morning at the opening of the annual "Old Glory" sale, which is a yearly fixture following immediately upon the close of the National Horse show. The sale will continue through the week. The consignments of pacers and trotters to go under the hammer are declared to be equal in class and number to the similar offerings in any year during the past decade.

ETTOR ASSURED FIRST DEGREE IS IMPOSSIBLE

PRESIDING JUSTICE
INSTRUCTS JURY
AT NOON

CARUSO ALONE OF THE
THREE MAY MEET DEATH

Death Sentence Is Spared Eitor When Justice Instructs Jury That No First Degree Murder Can Be Found on the Evidence—Case Goes to the Jury Shortly After Noon Hour.

Salem, Mass., Nov. 25.—Death sentences will not be imposed upon Eitor and Giovannitti, the Lawrence strike leaders charged with killing a woman striker, Anna Lapizzo, according to the instructions of Justice Quinn, to the jury today as the case went to the 12 men. The justice stated that second degree murder was the only verdict of guilt that could be returned.

The fate of the defendants went to at noon when Quinn concluded the instructions. The prisoners were jailed pending the outcome.

Quinn's instructions were a surprise. The court directed the jury that Caruso might be convicted of first or second degree murder to an extra force of deputies was on hand to preserve order in the court room. The report that dynamite was stolen from Haverhill yesterday to be used to dynamite the court house is uncredited.

Giovannitti declared that a general strike in Italy is possible in the event of a conviction.

Bishop Burgess's Anniversary.

New York, Nov. 25.—Many distinguished clergymen and laymen of the Protestant Episcopal church gathered today at St. Peter's church, in Brooklyn, to pay honor to the Rt. Rev. Frederick Burgess, on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of his consecration as bishop of Long Island. Prominent among those in attendance were Bishop Brewster of Connecticut, Bishop Burch of New York, and Congressman Redfield of Brooklyn.

Schrank Asylum Bound.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 25.—John Schrank started for the asylum at Oshkosh today. At 11 o'clock he bade farewell to the fellow prisoners. But it is believed his case is incurable insanity. In this way, he is to be punished for shooting at and seriously wounding Theodore Roosevelt in Milwaukee, just prior to the election when the colonel was about to deliver a speech here.

Oregon Convicts Heroically Fight Fire that Completely Unfettered Them

Salem, Ore., Nov. 25.—The west wing of the penitentiary was ablaze at noon. Convicts were taken from the building and special guards have been rushed here. It is feared many escaped.

Later the south wing of the new auditorium is burning. The fire started

at 10 o'clock and was soon beyond control. The convict fire-fighters are doing good work, but hydrant trouble aided the blaze.

The building will be destroyed.

Fifty officers were sworn in and armed and rushed to the scene but all convicts were fighting the blaze.

Business in the city is suspended and the full fire department is fighting

the blaze. It was partially controlled at noon.

Poor electric wiring on the stage of the auditorium caused the fire. The loss is \$3000. Convicts and prison apparatus finally extinguished the fire. The death chamber and gallows were exposed.

VAGUE RUMORS OF WAR START

SERBIAN-AUSTRIAN AFFAIR IS
UNSETTLED.

Stocks Slump and Bank Deposits Are Withdrawn During the Rumors.

Berlin, Nov. 25.—Vague rumors of war being declared between Austria and Serbia is causing the market to slump. The origin of the rumors is unlearned.

Another Armistice Declared.

Constantinople, Nov. 25.—The Ikdam, a Constantinople newspaper, says Turkey and the Balkan have agreed to a week's armistice.

Germany Becomes Ominous.

Berlin, Nov. 25.—It is reported Germany is mobilizing two army corps on the Russian frontier. Bank depositors are withdrawing funds.

King Peter Hears Discussion.

Belgrade, Nov. 25.—King Peter presided at a meeting of the cabinet today and announced later the government has notified Austria she is unable to outline the attitude before peace with Turkey.

France, Too, Is Warlike.

Geneva, Switzerland, Nov. 25.—France orders reservists to be ready to join the colors today. Railroads have been directed to assemble cars at strategic points.

Canal Conference Postponed.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 25.—Announcement is made that the Panama canal conference, which was to have assembled in this city tomorrow, has been postponed until next month. The postponement was made in order to insure a larger attendance of business men from all of the South Atlantic and Gulf states.

TWENTY DIE IN STARCH BLOW UP

ILLINOIS STARCH PLANT EXPLOSION HAS FATALITIES.

Forty Miners Also Reported Trapped in Mine Horror.

Waukegan, Ill., Nov. 25.—More than 20 persons are believed to be dead from an explosion wrecking the dry starch plant at the Cora Products Refining company.

Forty Reported Trapped.

Pittsboro, Pa., Nov. 25.—It is reported that forty miners were trapped in a cavern at the Barnum colliery of the Pennsylvania company today. No details are available.

Contends for Water Rights.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—The Hetch Hetchy valley case, which the city of San Francisco has been pushing for years, came up for a final hearing today before Secretary Fisher of the department of the interior. The case involves San Francisco's rights to the Hetch Hetchy valley in Yosemite National park for use in connection with a great municipal aqueduct scheme. The project has been vigorously opposed by John Muir the noted naturalist, and other persons interested in the scenic preservation of the Yosemite.

Librarians at Mitchell.

Mitchell, S. Dak., Nov. 25.—President Ledger of the American Library association is scheduled as the principal speaker at the annual convention of the South Dakota Library association, which met in this city today for a three days' session. Librarians and library trustees from all parts of the state are in attendance.

GIBSON'S SIN NOT ON "Y"

WALLA WALLA COMMERCIAL CLUB ANGERED.

Scandal Has No Bearing on Y. M. C. A. at Walla Walla, Stated.

La Grande church people are greatly shocked at the downfall and ignominious crimes of John Gibson, the prominent Walla Walla church worker, who has confessed to unspeakable crime following the confessions of nine Walla Walla boys. Gibson was in La Grande during the Men and Religion Forward movement last spring which the Walla Walla team brought to this city, and many local people know him well. However, overshadowing the interest outside of the city of Walla Walla in the near-Portland horror of this same nature, is the effort of certain people in Walla Walla to connect the Y. M. C. A. with the scandal. Gibson was a director and trustee in the Congregational church there, and incidentally was a member of the Y. M. C. A., but a great deal of indignation has been rife in Walla Walla because of efforts to malign the institution, via Gibson. The commercial club there has passed the following resolutions:

"Whereas the Commercial club of Walla Walla has always actively supported the Y. M. C. A. and greatly deprecates the attempt in any way to connect that institution with the disgrace of Gibson, and

"Whereas, in a mistaken spirit of levity we believe that a few well meaning citizens have in jest treated this matter lightly, therefore

"Be it resolved, that all members of the Commercial club discourage all slanderous remarks against the Y. M. C. A. and assist in protecting its good name and the high purpose for which it stands in this community."

Veteran Public Official Retires.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—After forty-five years spent in the public service, during which time he has filled important legislative, diplomatic and executive positions, Thomas Ryan today retired from the post of advisory counsel and special assistant to the secretary of the interior in connection with the affairs of the Five Civilized Tribes. Mr. Ryan was born in Oxford, N. Y., seventy-five years ago today. He served with a Pennsylvania regiment in the civil war and after the war located in Topeka, Kas., which has ever since been his legal residence. He served fourteen years as a representative in congress, four years as United States minister to Mexico and eleven years as assistant secretary of the interior.

Andrew Carnegie Is 77.

New York, Nov. 25.—Andrew Carnegie, capitalist, philanthropist, author and philosopher, is 77 years old today. Mr. Carnegie is as keen mentally as ever, and so far as his physical health is concerned, as he himself expresses it, he feels as rugged as if in all his 77 years he had been free and wild in the land of cakes by brae and burn. During the day congratulations were received at the Carnegie home in Fifth avenue from hundreds of friends, who wrote or telephoned.

Ex-Presidents Worry Many.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—Ex-presidents will be made "representatives at large," if Congressman Burleson's bill passes. According to Burleson no ex-president should engage in business or professional work. There is a good chance for the bill.

VICIOUS PLANS OF DYNAMITE FULLY UNFETTERED

DESTRUCTION OF LOS ANGELES WAS ONLY

A PART

PANAMA CANAL WAS TO BE WRECKED BY DYNAMITE

Cross Examination of McManigal Is Started by Senator Kern—Great and Vicious Schemes Unbarred by McManigal Before Defense Takes Him Over—Cross Examination Is on.

Indianapolis, Nov. 25.—Sworn testimony that John McManigal planned to complete the destruction of Los Angeles and dynamiting of all non-union jobs on the Panama canal, was given by Orrie McManigal at the trial of the laborites this morning.

"Burn the city of Los Angeles off the map," he swears McNamara told him.

"Make it a landmark like San Francisco after the earthquake."

The witness said that McNamara had planned also to send several of the "good men" of Los Angeles to start the fires and dynamite the waterworks.

The defense denounced the article in the Bridgeman's magazine, censuring the prosecution. The defense attorneys stated the defendants are not sympathetic with the article.

The witness said: "Motives prompting my crimes was the inflaming of my mind by men like John McNamara. Hookin had not dynamited for money but was informed he would have everything to win and nothing to lose." In answer to the first question on cross-examination by Senator Kern.

Before the direct examination was concluded McManigal testified that McNamara had planned to send him to Panama to locate the government magazine; then steal the dynamite, and blow up the canal.

McManigal detailed the trip to Detroit with Jim McNamara. He said he arrived on April 12, 1911. He gave the alias Afford when arrested by Burns' men and said he appealed to the crowd to save him from kidnapers. He described trips to Chicago and Los Angeles. He alleged that McNamara offered Detective huge bribes to let him escape.

McManigal suddenly turned McNamara over to the cross examiners. Kern asked for delay, Miller objecting. McManigal then admitted pleading guilty to grand larceny in Chicago.

Mining Congress Opens at Spokane.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 25.—Two thousand delegates, representing nearly every state of the union, assembled in Spokane today for the opening of the 15th annual meeting of the American Mining congress. The gathering is the most representative of its kind ever held in the country. The sessions will last four days. Among the important matters scheduled for consideration are federal control of mineral lands, "gold brick" mining promoters, revision of existing mining laws, the Alaskan situation, conservation, workmen's compensation, water power, mine taxation, railroad rates, the apex law, the tariff on lead and zinc, federal aid for state mining schools, and the location of the permanent headquarters of the mining congress.

Evacuation Day in New York.

New York, Nov. 25.—"Evacuation day"—the 129th anniversary of the departure of the last British troops from American soil, at the end of the revolutionary war—was celebrated in New York today in accordance with the custom of many years. A parade of the Old Guard to the Battery, where the stars and stripes were unfurled, and patriotic exercises in Central park and in Fort Greene park were the principal features of the day's observance.
