OLD MIREHOLE TO DISAPPEAR

PAVING COMPANY IS HAMMERED INTO ACTION.

Unpaved Portion to Be Graveled at Geo. Palmer's Expense.

Second street's mireholes in the region of Grandy avenue will be paved and graveled if the weather gods will remain favorable for a few days. The Warren Construction company is now laying hotstuff on the beginning of the worst mud hole in or around La Grande, north of Jefferson on Second and there remains yet some work to do before the pavers get to the point on Second street where the viaduct will commence to dip down to get under the Second street crossing. From the point where the pavers must stop to the railroad track and to North Second street macadam, George Palmer will at his own expense gravel the mud holes that not only his teams can get to the mill but the entire up-river district will have good roads into La Grande. A very few more days will complete this piece of paving which is only about two blocks in length, and one of the worst mudholes in Oregon will be eliminated.

It was only after a warm set-to with the company that this was accomplished. The company is anxious to close down its plant as winter is approaching, but last Wednesday night Councilman Campbell of the street committee opened a fight on the pavers that led to immediate resumption of excavation on Second street north of Jefferson and consequent paving. Because of this move, there will be good highways from all the North Second street districts to the city's paved district, allowing ranchers and up river people to get into the business section after they have reached the city limits. In years past this has been impossible oftentimes because of the extremely deep mudholes in the region of the Second street crossing.

"ED" CONLEY LAID TO REST

MANY FRIENDS FOLLOW BODY TO CEMETERY.

Well Known Union County Citizen Buried Yesterday Afternoon.

With a large number of friends of the bereaved family in attendance the funeral of the late Edward C. Conley was held yesterday from the home on Adams avenue. Mr. Conley died early in the week after a brief illness. The body was laid to rest at the Island City cemetery.

The deceased was born in Jefferson county, Illinois August 15, 1863, and died Nov. 19, 1912. He leaves a wife and four children, a father

mother, two brothers and one sister to mourn his death.

SMITH SLOW IN PLACING COIN

ACCEPTS WARNER'S CHALLENGE HOWEVER.

Warner Remains in Pendleton to Train, and to Issue Debt There.

Clarence Smith, the middleweight wrestler who threw Ed Warner at Union a few days ago, has accepted Warner's challenge for a match in this city Thanksgiving night but late today had not posted the forfeit money. Warner is in Pendleton where he will attend a go Wednesday evening given under auspices of the P. A. A. C., and will return to La Grande Thursday if the forfeit money is forthcoming. Warner will challenge the winner of the O'Connell-Pineau go at Pendleton November 27 and is training at the gym there.

Writing from Pendleton Dudley Evans, physical director-manager of the P. A. A. C., says that he hopes to see some La Granderers at the Pendleton match.

In a letter to McCloud of this city, Warner himself writes that he is anxious to meet either of the two at Pendleton and expresses his desire that Smith comes through with the forfeit money for the La Grande mill.

RECOUNT WILL START SOON

WALLOWA COUNTY RECOUNT THIS WEEK.

Week From Today Is Day Set for the Count in This County.

A recount of the general election vote, insofar as it pertains to the race for joint senator, demanded by John S. Hodgins, defeated candidate, will be commenced in Wallowa county this week. It is believed and then taken up in La Grande a week from today. This is the present schedule but if the session at Enterprise drags into another week, it is possible the Union county recount will have to be delayed a few days.

Interest in the outcome of the recount continues to be keen, as it is generally conceded that a matter of four votes one way or the other may be readily changed. The ballots allowed by precinct officials to stand as O. K. when there are minor infractions of the law but the intent of the voter being left more or less apparent, may not pass muster when put to the acid test of a recount before a judicial supervisor. Out of the votes cast in the counties, a four vote lead may easily be increased or

reversed, it is agreed, and there is general interest in the result.

STUDENT AGE CENSUS GROWS

NORTH LA GRANDE WILL ADD TO 1911 TOTAL.

Believed Substantial Growth of the School Census Will Be Shown.

An increase in school attendance, the exact number of which is not yet known, will be shown when the annual school census is completed. The Fourth ward or North La Grande is showing the greatest increase in any portion of the city, and the percentage that the total will go up will be largely guided by figures from the North side. As soon as the count has been completed, it will be checked up in the office of School Clerk Williams and the final count determined. The school appropriations are largely governed by the number of pupils of school age in the district.
