

GUNMEN SENT TO ELECTRIC CHAIR JAN. 6

MURDERERS TAKE SENTENCES WITH GRINS AND SMILES

FINAL APPEAL WILL BE TAKEN WITHIN A WEEK

Great Army of Guards Protect Gunmen as They Are Rushed to the Tomb—Long Overcoats Conceal Weapons—Men Receive Sentences With Cold-Blooded Mien, and Smile

New York, Nov. 26.—"Lefty Louie" Rosenberg, "Gyp the Blood" Harrowitz, "Whkey" Lewis, and "Dago Frank" Cirofici, were sentenced to electrocution by Justice Goff today. They will hang in the week of January 6th.

The gunmen were taken from the court to prison in charge of the sheriff and a dozen guards who wore long overcoats with a revolver in each pocket. But there was no demonstration.

Lewis was the first one sentenced; he smiled. In the absence of the district attorney, Assistant Moss moved the imposing of the death sentence. The defense attorneys read 10 objections but were overruled. Each gunman was removed separately from the courtroom and rushed to the tomb, handcuffed to deputies. At the central station an entire coachload of armed men were reserved for the guards and prisoners.

The prisoners were unemotional and laughed and joked. While the defense counsel, was the only one that got a handshake, and he only from "Dago Frank." The others were cold-blooded. While said a final appeal would be taken within a week. Judge William P. Lawlor, who sentenced Abe Ruef, sat beside Goff while sentence was imposed.

Tillman Fights for Children

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 26.—In the South Carolina supreme court today, Chief Justice Gary listened to arguments in the habeas corpus proceedings brought by Benjamin R. Tillman, Jr., to secure the custody of his two children. The marital troubles of the Tillmans are of long standing and culminated in the separation of the couple more than a year ago, since which time the children have been with their mother. Ever since the separation Mr. Tillman's father, United States Senator Tillman, has aided in the fight for custody of his two grandchildren. In a most remarkable petition filed with the court Senator Tillman admits that his son has been a drunkard, but declares that he has now reformed and is a proper guardian for his children.

Preparing for Great Anniversary

New York, Nov. 26.—Plans for American participation in the celebration of the approaching centennial anniversary of the treaty of Ghent were discussed today at a meeting of the committee of arrangements in this city. The anniversary, which comes on Dec. 24, 1914, will mark the rounding out of one hundred years of peace between Great Britain and the United States. Many novel suggestions for the celebration have been received by the committee. Some of the proposals call for the holding of international peace conferences, the issue of memorial postage, coins and medals, the erection of peace monuments along the Canadian border and on the principal battle sites of the War of 1812, and a great marine peace parade through the great lakes from Buffalo to Duluth.

McEvoy-Sullivan Wedding

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 26.—St. Matthew's Roman Catholic church was filled this morning at the wedding of Miss Helen Sullivan and William P. McEvoy. The bride is the daughter of Roger C. Sullivan, for many years the Democratic national committee man and party leader in Illinois.

"Tama Jim" Nears Tape

JAMES WILSON DOOMED TO MEET REMOVAL.

KINSHIP NO AVAIL

When Republican Ship Sinks "Tama" Jim Goes Down With It.

Washington, Nov. 26.—(Special) "Well, goodbye, Jim. Take keer of yourself," Whitcomb Riley had another Jim in mind when he wrote these immortal lines, but in the fullness of time they have come to fit "Tama Jim" Wilson of Iowa, who is soon to make his farewell bow as a cabinet minister after breaking all records, domestic and foreign and phonograph, in that capacity.

A man has to remember a long way back to recall the time when James Wilson of Tama county was not secretary of agriculture. He succeeded Jeremiah Rusk of Wisconsin when McKinley was inaugurated president the first time. That was in 1897 and Uncle Jim has kept the chair of agriculture warm continuously since that time. There have been fat years and lean years, panics and prosperity, sunshine and rain, happiness and gloom, but through it all Uncle Jim has sat in the councils of the ruler and loafed around the throne. When Roosevelt succeeded McKinley, Uncle Jim's friends advised him to pack his suitcase and prepare to track back to the old homestead in Tama county, but Uncle Jim didn't pack. T. R. tore up all the ground around Uncle Jim, but uncle remained calm, serene and unscathed. When Taft succeeded Roosevelt and threw out every Roosevelt officer one after another with astonishing regularity, Uncle Jim's friends called his attention again to the handwriting on the wall, but Uncle Jim couldn't see it. He stayed on the job.

ETTOR, GIOVANNITTI AND CARUSO ACQUITTED OF MURDER AFTER A LONG WEARY JAIL IMPRISONMENT

Hundreds Rush to Embrace Acquitted and Lawrence is in Gala Spirits

CALLS IT VICTORY FOR THE LABORING CLASSES

Defendants Shout at Jury and Judge When Verdict is Announced in Court Room This Morning

Salem, Mass., Nov. 26.—Ettor, Giovanni and Caruso, I. W. W. leaders who have been jailed since Anna Lapizzo was slain during the Lawrence strike, were acquitted of murder this morning by a sealed verdict reached last night but held secret until court resumed this morning.

Immediately the verdict was announced pandemonium broke loose. The defendants clasped each other in their arms and wept.

"I thank you in the name of justice and civilization, gentlemen of the jury," Giovanni screamed.

"I thank you in the name of the working class," Ettor shouted, the din necessitating loud speaking.

Hundreds of workmen crowded to the defendants and embraced them. Caruso embraced his wife.

After the verdict the judge announced that Caruso would be released on \$100 bail for the additional

indictments against him. Ettor and Giovanni were released on \$500 each, but it is generally believed the indictments will be dropped.

Gurley-Lynn, a leader for the acquitted was president of a mass meeting this afternoon, the defendants attending. Ettor addressed them.

"Except for you I would be sleeping in death. We are no longer living in days when a man will be guillotined for his ideals."

Giovanni spoke in Italian. Lawrence plans an acquittal celebration tonight.

Calls It Big Victory

Attorney Moore, of Los Angeles, who was one of the counsel for the defense, declared the acquittal was a victory for organized labor. He said "This is another example that an English speaking jury will not convict for purely constructive crime. It is a free speech victory."

TVEITMOE, ANGERED, SPRINGS AT M'MANIGAL IN WITNESS CHAIR

Indianapolis, Nov. 26.—Olaf A. Tveitmoe, a defendant in the laborites trial and said by McManigal to be one of the arch criminals of the arch criminals of the dynamiters, leaped at McManigal from his seat by counsel's table during the cross examination today, angered by words of the witness. He was persuaded to return to his seat but the witness twisted and squirmed and finally was

so disconcerted that the judge ordered Tveitmoe to sit with the other defendants.

It is believed the cross examination of McManigal will conclude today.

McManigal declared he carried explosives in Pullman cars and said that once he told Hockin when the latter urged him to finish up more dynamite "jobs." "Any time I am caught at this game, I want it understood that you are to be caught, too."

DYNAMITE SUSPECTED CAUSE OF YESTERDAY'S ILLINOIS HORROR

Waukegan, Ill., Nov. 26.—Detectives are establishing a connection between the explosion in the Corn Products company plant yesterday that killed 20, and the fire in the Union Sulphur company building at Brooklyn. The Standard Oil controls both. Officials of that company hint that both disasters have a suspicious origin.

Waukegan officials have declared that the fullest investigation will be conducted. Executives of the Corn

Products plant were summoned before the coroner's jury.

A general public funeral of the victims is the plan now. Business is suspended during the obsequies.

Officials of the Corn Products company will not admit that more than 10 were killed. They declare that some of the injured might die. Six bodies are in the morgue, three are expected to die. The hospital men declare that five other are fatally injured.

Brand Whitlock Coming Home

Berlin, Nov. 26.—Brand Whitlock, mayor of Toledo, and Mrs. Whitlock, who have been making rather an extensive tour of Europe, sailed for New York today on the Kronprinzessin in Cecile. Mayor Whitlock expresses himself as well satisfied with the results of his tour, which was devoted principally to an inspection of public buildings and an investigation of the methods of municipal government in the chief European cities.

Father Lowery, pastor of the local Catholic church.

GLOOM CLOUDS LIFT; PEACE IS RESTORED

WAR POSSIBLE BUT IM- PROBABLE SAY THE LEADERS

KAISER IS THOUGHT TO BE URGING PEACE

Strained Conditions Throughout Europe Is Lessened Slightly Today by News That Danger of War Is Lapping Slightly in European Centers—Outcome Finally Amicable.

London, Nov. 26.—Dallies of England are declaring that Europe's reason is restored and there is no serious danger of a general clash. It is generally believed the situation will be adjusted amicably and that Turkey and the Balkans will in the end agree to peace.

Possible, Improbable

Berlin, Nov. 26.—It is not believed that a general war in Europe is impossible but improbable. This is the declaration of important government officials and it is believed to be the kaiser's views. It is likewise understood that Germany is urging Turkey to accept peace.

The trouble is of an indefinite nature, and the mystery is adding to the general alarm. Today has seen more reassuring news and statements than any time in the past week—a gloomy week when European war might be declared at any moment.

Dr. Mary Walker 80 Years Old

Oswego, N. Y., Nov. 26.—Dr. Mary E. Walker, the widely known advocate of woman's rights and "dress reform" is 80 years old today. Her home is in this city and all of her living relatives reside in this vicinity. Much of her life has been spent in traveling about the country, with long periods of residence in New York, Washington and other cities. Last March she passed through a dangerous illness and since then she has lived on her farm near here, devoting much of her time to writing.

Dr. Walker was born in Oswego, Nov. 26, 1832, her parents being descendants of colonial settlers. Her parents erected on their farm near here the first free school in this section of the state. She attended this school, and later the Syracuse Medical college, where she was graduated M. D. in 1855. She began practice at Columbus, O., but later located in Rome, N. Y.

Among other distinctions, Dr. Walker has that of being the first woman physician in the world to hold a commission as assistant army surgeon. Upon the outbreak of the civil war she entered the union service in her professional capacity. For bravery and valuable services in the field she was awarded a medal of honor, which she always wore conspicuously. During her service in the war she had the unique distinction of being exchanged as a prisoner of war for a man of her rank in the service.

In later years Dr. Walker became a leader in the woman suffrage movement, and she claims to have been the first woman to attempt voting at the polls. She has made suffrage speeches throughout the United States and England.

Wilson's Health Better

Hamilton, Bermuda, Nov. 26.—Woodrow Wilson has completely recovered his digestion. On Thanksgiving day he goes to a theatre and Sunday he will attend a tea and play tennis at the residence of the governor general.

Telegraph School Under Cloud

Seattle, Nov. 26.—M. A. Sweeney, manager of the telegraph school, has been arrested by federal indictment charging he did not employ competent instructors. He collected fees from prospective telegraphers. He was jailed in default of \$3,000 bail.
