"SKY PILOT" LIKES CALLING

MISSIONARY IN BURNS DISTRICT LIKES WORK.

No Fallsmans But a Stage; Still He Enjoys the Vocation.

The business of saving souls, even though not the most lucrative to be found, is nevertheless surrounded with more or less of comparatively easy work, and seldom makes any demands upon the missionary that could in any way be compared to the heroic struggle of a St. Paul or some foreign missionary.

But now and then, even in our supposedly well settled country, there are such vast stretches between stations, and so much hardship is undergone in the observance of a self-imposed duty, along missionary lines, that the recital of them often reads like a novel concerning pioneer days. Such is the story of Father Klein, whom the writer had the pleasure of meeting at the Catholic parsonage. Father Klein many years ago chose to follow in the footsteps of the Apostles, and is now doing missionary work along a two hundred mile route. An ordinary trip on a Pullman is as uninteresting when compared to Father Klein's mode of travel, as gingham is compared to Damascus brocade linen. About the first of the month he leaves his quiet retreat in Burns, mounts the stage for some distant mission, and just keeps on going the rounds, until the great, tedious trip of two hundred miles is accomplished. His plush cushions are Uncle Sam's mail pouches; his traveling companions the stage driver and the birds of the forest. Uphill five thousand feet or more, downhill another thousand or more, sharp cliff roads, mudholes, rocky bumpy passages and no cover of any kind save the spacious sky.

This he has been doing not for a month or two months—no, for eighteen years. When asked why he chose to undertake such hardships, he smiled genially, as much as to say:

"If we had a railroad I would travel on that; but duty prompts us to overcome all these things." For this labor he receives enough to wear, coarse food and a place to sleep. His rugged hardy features bespeak wiry health and a great storehouse of energy.

When the route along which he travels is settled by newcomers, whose roads are traversed by the iron horse, or the gas moto rear, Father Klein will have left a fitting introduction to a history of development where mediocre courage, or perhaps better said, the fear of isolation, of deprivation and real danger kept the venturesome from going.
