NEGLIGENCE CAUSED DEATH

FAMOUS JONES CASE OF COVE IS
DECIDED.

Supreme Court Holds That Victim
Was Himself Responsible.

The supreme court at Salem yesterday handed down a large number of decisions in cases recently submitted at Pendleton. The most important are the Jones case from Union, and the Emmons local option case from Wallowa county. The latter case will undoubtedly have the effect of making prosecutions under the local option law much easier, as it is said that practically every question that can be raised in these cases has been adjudicated by the supreme court. The cases decided of local interest are:

Traction Engine Owner Loses.

Mary Arlie Jones, administratrix of the estate of John T. Jones, vs. Union county, appellant. This was a suit to recover damages for injuries caused by the falling of a bridge on the public highway. The plaintiff alleged that the county was negligent in not keeping the bridge in repair. Jones was driving a traction engine over the bridge and the supreme court reversed the lower court and dismissed the suit on the ground that Jones did not comply with the law which requires the placing of planks beneath the wheels of the engine. A Union county jury gave the widow \$3,000.

School district No. 6, of Wallowa county, appellant, vs. Bert Elton Smith, et al, affirmed.

W. B. Hunter, appellant, vs. D. H. Harris, appealed from Wallowa county; action for contribution as co-surety on a note. The plaintiff appealed from a judgment of non suit. The case is reversed and remanded.

First National bank of Joseph vs. John P. Rusk, appellant, appealed from Union county; suit for \$34.45 over attorney's fees; affirmed.

J. D. Day vs. J. H. Green and W. E. Pickering, appellants; appealed from Wallowa; suit to foreclose loggers' lien; affirmed.

L. S. Kelsey vs. Charles Bertram, appellant, appealed from Union; suit to enjoin defendant from interfering with an irrigating canal; affirmed.

George W. Wagener vs. United States National bank of La Grande, appellant; appealed from Union; suit to recover \$66.33; affirmed.

State of Oregon vs. W. J. Wilson, appellant; appealed from Union on sentence for larceny; affirmed.

State vs. Al. Emmons and A. H. Chapman, appellants; local option cases from Wallowa county; affirmed.

F. W. Paine and J. G. Paine, appellants, vs. Milton, Freewater & Hudson Bay Irrigating company, et al; appealed from Umatilla county; injunction suit over use of water; reversed and injunction allowed.

R. A. West vs. Duncan McDonald, appellant; appealed from Union county; reversed and remanded.

ECONOMY IS SARGENT'S AIM

ATE FROM THIRD WARD
CONTINUES POLICY.

Commission Form of Government Is One Plank.

Economy of the city's affairs; to save a dollar in value for every dollar of the city's money expended, and to assist in adopting the commission form of city government in La Grande are the reasons for entering the contest for councilman from the Third ward.

This was the statement made by W. B. Sargent to the Observer today when asked for something pertaining to his candidacy for councilman.

Continuing, Mr. Sargent said: "I realize the burden of work for a councilman who goes into the city's business as he should if he accepts an election, and it is a burden that no man invites. But to my mind the time has come when something should be done in La Grande that will bring about more economical conditions; that will force those who deal with the city to give full value for the city money they receive. The greatest thing that can happen to La Grande is the adoption of a sane and safe charter providing for commission form of government. The city is too large to take the chance with the old form of council and if elected it will be my aim to at once begin on a commission form that will be submitted to the people for their adoption or rejection before many months roll by. These are the only reasons why I am willing to take up the work, but with these just reasons in mind I have decided to make the race and hereby ask the support of the voters."

Mr. Sargent served as councilman many years ago. He is an attorney of years of practice in La Grande and is identified with one of the strongest business institutions of the city.

SUDDEN TEST SHOWS SPEED

DEPARTMENT CREW TUMBLES
FROM BED TO AUTO.

Less Than Three Minutes Required to
Get to the Scene.

Any idea that La Grande is not equipped with an up-to-date fire fighting apparatus must now be dispelled. Last night Dr. Lincoln sent in a test alarm from Cedar and Main streets, a distance of eight blocks with one sharp turn. The fire laddies had snugly cuddled under the quilts when the unexpected burr of the alarm system brought them scurrying to their feet. Trousers on, a slide down the brass pole, a speedy crank of the fifty-horse power combination car, a jump to position, and the foe of fire was speeding down Adams avenue in true metropolitan style. In less than three minutes they were at the scene of the supposed fire, proving wonderful speed over former systems, and ready to dash a gushing stream of Beaver Creek's best on the destructive element. This achievement puts La Grande in a new class in a number of ways. First is that of security, with distance a negligible factor. Second, reduced insurance rates, and third, the probable reduction of accidents. La Grande could not have made a more conservative investment, as liberal as the machine is in speed and power. It's a step from village traditions to the up-to-date life of the progressive city. Other things will follow suit.
