Y., Nov. 28.—The wedding of Miss Blanche Bates, the actress and George Creel who holds the office of police commissioner in the city of Denver, took place at the bride's country home near here today. The ceremony was attended by a number of persons well known to the stage and in public life. The couple have planned a honeymoon trip to Cuba and Panama, returning to Denver in the spring to make that city their home.

Miss Bates, who was born in Portland, Oregon, in 1873, has long been one of the foremost actresses of the American stage. In recent years, under the direction of David Belasco she achieved notable successes in "Under Two Flags", "The Darling of the Gods" and "The Girl of the Golden West". Today's marriage to Mr. Creel is the actress's second venture into matrimony. Her first husband was Lieutenant Milton F. Davis, U. S. A., to whom she was married in San Francisco early in her professional career.
