HEAD FARMER TO COME.

C. S. Barrett is expected to attend Baker Convention.

C. S. Barrett, president of the National Farmers' Union, will be the chief figure in the convention of the Farmers' Union of the Eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho districts, which convenes in Baker December 3 and continues December 4 and 5. Mr. Barrett has been suggested as secretary of agriculture in the next cabinet. His determination to come to the Baker convention was made known today in a letter to A. B. Swift, of this city.

George Miller, president of the county organization, has announced that J. D. Brown, of Arlington, Ore., vice president of the national organization; L. C. Crow, president of the Washington state union, and others of equal repute will take prominent parts on the program with Mr. Barrett. Between 300 and 400 delegates and guests are expected.

La Grande and all Union county is going to send a large delegation to Baker. Union county has many members in the union and also has had some of her men high in the state councils.

"SPARE RIBS" OUT, "GRAVY" IN.

That the mayor and recorder of the city of La Grande, Oregon, be and they are hereby authorized to enter into a contract with the Warren Construction company for the pavement of Fourth street from the south line of D avenue to the north line of C avenue, at the price according to their bid accepted on the 20th day of November, 1912, and on file in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, Oregon.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be

in full force and effect from and after its passage by the council, approval by the mayor, and posting in accordance with the city charter, on and after the 27th day of November, 1912.

The bridge was constructed for the Kentucky and Indiana Terminal Railroad company at a cost of about \$2,000,000. Its greatest span is 620 feet long and weighs 4,400 tons.

Pendleton Indian Is Indicted.

(Pendleton East Oregonian.)
Columbia George, the well known local Indian who has been in the county jail since last July awaiting the action of the law on the charge of murder which has been placed against him, was indicted yesterday morning in Portland for first degree murder by the federal grand jury, according to advices received here. Much delay was caused because of the difficulty in determining whether or not the crime was properly in the jurisdiction of the state or the federal court.

Columbia George was arrested in July the day after the mutilated body of Timot, an aged squaw, was found in the Umatilla river about three miles above this city. Circumstances connected him with the foul crime and, following his arrest, a strong chain of circumstantial evidence was forged which has resulted in his indictment.

Columbia George with Toy Toy was convicted ten or more years ago for the murder of Anna Edna, another squaw, and after serving eight years of a life term, was pardoned by President Taft.
