

WOMAN DECLARES HERSELF RULING EMPRESS OF TURKS

SAVIOUR OF TURKS SPRINGS TO LIMELIGHT

LONDON SUBURB PRODUCE SCLAISANT TO THRONE

DESCENDANT OF DEPOSED RULER RETURNS

Result of Her Claims to the Turkish Throne May Be a Settlement of European Strife—Historians Credit Her Claims, Greece Will Recognize Her and World Is Excited.

London, Nov. 30.—Princess Eugenie Christoforou Paleologus, a descendant of the Roan emperors, ruling house of Constantinople before the entry of the Turks, has announced herself the empress of Turkey and her claim is generally sustained. Diplomats are considering the establishment of a princess ruler of Turkey in an endeavor to prevent an European war. The princess resides in the Kensington district, London.

Friends are raising funds to send "the empress" to Constantinople, urging her to appear to the people of that city and demand restoration to the throne of her ancestors. Many chancy authentications her pedigree and historians concede her succession from Byzantine emperors and declare the creation of a "Buffer" state with the capital at Constantinople, will be necessary to preserve neutrality in the Dardanelles, and the raising of the princess to the throne of European Turkey is the only solution. The military league at Athens is sustaining the princess and it is believed that Greece will officially support her claims.

JUNKET IS LIKED

Local business men who have been approached upon the matter, heartily approve it and President Robinson of the Commercial association is of the belief that no difficulty would be encountered in making up a Pullman from this city. He thinks, however, that a party from here might want to go on to Southern Oregon or California in which case arrangements could easily be made.

CAMERON GIRL HAS ESCAPED

JOHNSON IS ACCUSED OF ABDUCTING HER.

Letters From Girl Proposing Marriage Are Published.

Chicago, Nov. 30.—Lucille Cameron, the white girl who has ostracized herself by love for the champion prize fighter, has disappeared and Jack Johnson, her paramour, is charged with her abduction. He declares he knows nothing of her whereabouts but admits she has left her mother.

Mother, Too, Is Ignorant.

Mrs. F. Cameron Falconer, mother of the girl, told the district attorney today that she knows nothing of the whereabouts of Lucille, and the officials think she is telling the truth. The girl was allowed to leave prison in held in jail for weeks as a material witness against Johnson in the white slave business.

Johnson admits having received letters from the girl proposing marriage, even since the scandals broke out. The black asserted the girl had disowned her mother and planned to marry him and he declared he would ask the socialist papers to publish the girl's letter. "This is because it is the only Chicago paper to give me a square deal," he said.

The girl left her rooms in the hotel saying she was going to a dressmaker. Then someone telephoned the mother the girl had left the city. Government officials think the girl is hiding.

Cavein Causes Death.

Pittsburg, Nov. 30.—A cave-in of the banks of the city filtration plant buried three men alive. Men who were extricated were rushed to the hospital, several dying on the way. Many of the men working on the excavating had narrow escapes.

Strikers Won't Stop Plant.

Pittsburg, Nov. 30.—In spite of the activity of the strikers, officials of the Carnegie steel mills reiterate the statement that work will be resumed tomorrow. A committee of the strikers is holding a conference with men of other plants, for the purpose of creating a sympathetic strike.

SUFFRAGETTE PRACTICE IS DEATH-CAUSE

ACID THROWN INTO LETTER BOXES IS FATAL

ONE LETTER WITH MONEY FOR POOR LOST

One Person Dead, Another Dying Because Suffragettes of London Are Throwing Acid Into Letter Boxes—Those Suspected Openly Insulted and Violence Is Generally Feared.

London, Nov. 30.—It is learned that one letter was ruined when suffragettes threw acid into a letter box containing money sent by a young laborer to save the lives of his mother and baby sister. The letter with its mission of life-saving did not arrive and the sister died and the mother is not expected to live. Arrests are progressing and endeavor will be made to locate the laborer for testimony against suffragettes.

Many Letters Ruined.

The police have been notified that thousands of letters have been ruined by such tactics, and the missing letters are causing untold suffering. The postoffices are flooded with inquiries for missing letters. The women suspected of being the suffragettes doing the work are being insulted openly and violence is feared.

La Granders Buy in Baker.

A deal was completed today where by H. Halvorsen and M. H. Christiansen of La Grande have bought the Electric theatre of this city and will open it up next Tuesday for business, says the Baker Herald. Before opening, however, the new men expect to remodel the building and make it up-to-date in every particular. Mr. Christiansen is an experienced man in the show business and will undoubtedly make a big success of the business in this city. The new owners took possession today and will begin their renovation work immediately.

William H. Hamlett who has been running the theatre for the past four or five months is as yet undecided what he will do but will probably take it easy for a while.

Registration Progressing.

Up to noon today the registration for the coming city election was 673. Mr. Davis, special city recorder, estimates that 500 of these are women. It should be borne in mind that men registered for the last general election are not required to register specially for the city election.

COOK WILL INVOLVE PEARY IN FEDERAL COURT TRIALS

Dr. Cook arrived quietly today and said he had positive evidence that Edward Barrill of Tacoma his companion on the Mount McKinley trip, received \$2,500 as a bribe to discredit him. He knows the name of the bank and the banker handling the bribe.

Suffragette Hurls Shoe At British Magistrate

Aberdeen, Eng., Nov. 30.—Life has gone all wrong with a local suffragette. She mistook Rev. Forbes Jackson for David Lloyd-George and horsewhipped him across the face and was arrested. Lloyd-George was in town. When she got to court she was denied immediate trial and became extremely angry. Quickly taking off a shoe she hurled it at the magistrate who had refused to give her immediate trial. For that she was jailed—for contempt of court. She was Grace Locke.

OREGON CITY THROBS WITH NEW POLITICS

CANDIDACY OF MRS. NEWTON OPPOSED

WOMEN OF OREGON CITY BANNED TO HALT PROGRESS

Holding the Woman Candidate Lacks Experience in Politics, the Women of That City Have Formed Club to Prevent Her Election—First Oregon Woman to Seek an Office.

Oregon City, Or., Nov. 30.—The recent enfranchisement of women in Oregon has inspired a courageous woman of Oregon City to announce her candidacy for the office of mayor but the idea, however, has not appealed to all her sisters in the same light, and an unnamed organization of forty women is trying to put the "quietus" on her political aspirations. Their slogan of opposition is her lack of sufficient experience in political affairs. Many of them are taxpayers and are not willing to risk intricate matters of municipal government in the hands of a politically untutored woman.

Mrs. Newton is the first woman of the state to seek office.

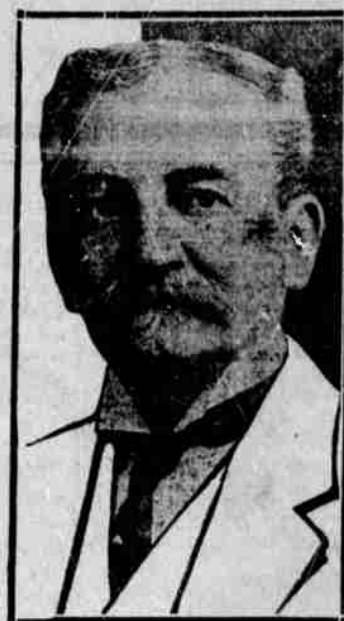
WRESTLING DATE CHANGE.

NAVY SEVEN VICTORS BY A 6 TO 0 SCORE

SMART SOCIETY PRESENT TO WITNESS CONTEST

ANNUAL CLASH BETWEEN ARMY BRANCHES HELD

Monster Throng Sees Two Teams Battle Through Three Periods for No Score and Then Sees Navy Place Two Field Goals Over the Bar for the Deciding Score of Game.

Philadelphia, Nov. 30.—Two field goals, that element in scoring so prominent in 1912, spelled victory for the naval academy at Annapolis today on Franklin field, when, in the last quarter, the navy scored two field goals. The army was held scoreless. The best society of New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Newport and other towns, saw the two teams battle through three periods without a score. Secretaries Stimson and Meyer, the governors of Pennsylvania, Delaware, Connecticut and many other prominent men, were in attendance to root for the contending teams. The cadets were five to three favorites from the start.

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 30.—The 1912 football season will close tomorrow afternoon with the annual battle between the West Point and Annapolis teams on Franklin Field. From a social standpoint the game eclipses all others. Washington society never fails to attend the game in force, while everybody who can get away from the war and navy and other departments in the national capital are to be found in the stands. The battalion of cadets from each academy attended the game together with a host of army and navy officers from all of the stations within a radius of 500 miles of Philadelphia.

The game is played as usual under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania, which was instrumental in bringing the two academies together in 1899 for annual football games after a break of six years. Since 1899 all games have been held on Franklin field except the contest of 1905 which was played at Princeton.

The first time that the blue and gold of the navy met the black, gold and gray of the army on the gridiron was in 1899, when the Annapolis team defeated the West Point eleven by a score of 24 to 0. Since then 15 games have been played between the two academies. Of this number each institution has seven victories to its credit, the contest in 1905 having resulted in a tie.

A record breaking crowd of more than 30,000 spectators witnessed the game. A total of 30,680 tickets for the game have been equally distributed between the University of Pennsylvania and the two academies. The West Point and Annapolis share of tickets are not sold but distributed gratis to officers and others identified with the two arms of the service and to prominent men in government circles. Pennsylvania's share was sold this year at \$3.00 a ticket, an increase of 50 cents over the highest price heretofore. The proceeds of the sale are given to the organizations for the relief of the dependent widows and orphans of officers and enlisted men of the army and navy.
