IMPRESSIVE WORDS, SONGS AND ACTS MARK LODGE OF SORROW

votion to their fellowmen. The worthy chaplain, Mr. Hackman, then recited the ceremonial invocation. Mr. Cochran in beautiful sentences voiced the spirit of charity that prevailed among them, symbolizing their acts by referring to the obliterating waves of the sea that washed away their misdeeds and the carving upon imperishable stone their deeds worth remembering. He read a short biography of each departed Elk, speaking of some as pioneers whose course had been run, of others, who had unfortunately fallen in the race whilst the sun was at its height. The waves of charity, said he, have washed away the records of their faults and left lying in the sands of memory the gems which living brothers will pick up and place in their crown of glorious memory.

It remained for the Hon. N. J. Sinnott, representative-elect of this district, the principal speaker for the occasion, to weave garlands of rarest beauty. It was a masterful eulogy and bespoke painstaking preparation and wide reading. He began his address by referring to the spirit of rest and mourning proclaimed by mother nature. The dying verdure in the field and on the mountains proclaims the dying year. The hectic flush on bush and tree are evidences of the near dissolution. He joined all the lodges throughout the land in voicing the spirit of reverence for the dead. But when he spoke of all embracing charity, that charity which does not parade under the form of gaudy gifts, but works under the garb of humility, that Godlike charity, which makes mercy seasoned justice, one could not but feel the potency of the great golden rule, in which all our acts should express themselves.

Poet and sage, philosopher and orator were enlisted in his effort to dress sentiment in its most beautiful raiment. Quoting from a poem by Maurice Francis Egan, he disclosed that there were no flowers until the first child had been placed in the cradles of mother earth, no roses bloomed until the first loved heart sprouted forth the perfumed petals from the cool sod, no violets until the first tear of mercy had watered the spot on the bosom of mother earth.

It was a magnificent address and lack of space prevents us from giving it in full.

The vocal numbers rendered by the Mesdames Corbett and Richardson were beautifully appropriate, and the splendid marches contributed by Professor Armstrong gave the whole the rounded effect which made the program all told, a splendid tribute to the spirits of departed Elks.

J. J. Pearce and other members of the committee today claim this to be the most impressive service held in many a year, and one that will last in memory.

The decorations of chrysanthemums and white carnations and Oregon grape were tasty and added no small part to the making of fitting memorial services.
