JOSEPH BANK REORGANIZED

L. KNAPPER REMAINS AT HEAD OF INSTITUTION.

Young Cashier Given Charge of the Banking House.

Joseph, Dec. 3.—(Special)—Important changes have been made in the stock ownership and management of the First National bank of Joseph. The Scribner interests have been sold to L. Knapper, D. W. Warnock, C. L. Hartshorn, L. E. Caviness and A. K. Parker. Aaron Wade also sold his stock and retired from the directorate. Mr. Caviness was chosen to succeed him as vice president.

The board of directors now consists of Mr. Knapper, Mr. Warnock, Mr. Hartshorn, Mr. Caviness, Mr. Parker and J. P. Avarill. Mr. Knapper remains president. A. K. Parker, who has been Mr. Scribner's assistant, becomes cashier. Mr. Parker is probably the youngest bank cashier in Oregon.

F. F. Scribner, who has been cashier of the bank since its organization seven years ago, expects to leave Joseph the middle of December, going to Portland, then to California, and thence back to his former home in Iowa. He has several banking locations in mind in California, and it is probable he will locate there, after he and his wife have finished their visit in the east.

Old Rivals at War.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 2.—A controversy that promises to become national in scope has sprung up in Spokane between relatives of rival claimants for the honor of being the youngest soldier in the civil war.

In the heat of the moment, the great struggle is being fought over again, and an arbitration board may be called in to settle the question.

In the van of the attacking party is A. H. Lyon, a plumber at Fort George Wright. Lyon recently wrote to the Army and Navy Journal to set up the claim of his father, John P. Lyon who, he says, enlisted five days before his 11th birthday.

Mrs. Henry G. Mikesell of Spokane on hearing of the Lyon claim, executed a flank movement in behalf of her cousin, Colonel John Clem of the United States army, now stationed at Chicago. During the heat of the battle one of the followers of the Clem-Mikesell standard made the statement that when the whole story was told, "it would be seen that by comparison with Colonel Clem, Private Lyon was an elderly man when enlisted at the age of 11."

"Colonel Clem was born in 1851 and enlisted in 1861 in an Ohio regiment" said Mrs. Mikesell. "He was not quite ten years old, and had to run away from home. He was too small to carry a drum, so they gave him a little flag."

"After John Clem had been in the thick of the fray for a year, a relative recognized him and threatened to tell the lad's parents. But the little standard bearer could not bear the thought of leaving the army, so he ran away from his company and re-enlisted in a Michigan regiment. Afterwards, with General Tom Thumb, he toured the world as the young soldier in the civil war. Later he was given a commission, and is still in the army, with three years of service before retirement."
