**CONGRESS OF
MOTHERS ACTIVE****PROPOSE BILL TO PENSION
NEEDY MOTHERS.**

**Mothers' Congress Explains Nature
of Proposed Bill.**

The Oregon Congress of Mothers is presenting to the voters of the state a bill which it hopes will be placed upon the statute books of Oregon—a bill to provide for the assistance and support of women whose husbands are dead or are inmates of some state institution and who have small children dependent upon them. This measure has been drafted carefully, so as to prevent waste of money, and yet made liberal enough to include the needy. Copies of the bill have been received in this city.

If the family includes but one child the mother shall receive \$10 a month. If there are more children, she shall receive at the rate of \$7.50 per month per child. No mother can receive this pension for a child over 16 years of age. No mother who receives an income from other sources is entitled to the relief afforded, unless that income is less than the one provided for her by the measure. The money shall be distributed through the courts and its distribution is regulated so as to prevent abuses.

Two states in the union have similar laws—Illinois and Missouri. Several cities have funds to be used for the same purpose. Massachusetts, Ohio, California and Washington are considering bills of the same import. In defense of the bill Mrs. H. H. Bushnell, chairman of the publicity committee of the Oregon congress of Mothers and Parent Teachers' association, says:

In Defense of the Bill.

"The home is the bulwark of the church, the school, and the nation.

To home is the best and most effective place of education that exists. The mother is the truest and best natural guardian for her children. She can do more for them than any other person. Nothing but mental or moral unfitness should separate a mother from her child. And yet, all over the country, in every city and every state, the little ones are driven from their homes, not for crime or wrong, but because of poverty. Remove the bread winner—the father—and it takes an exceptionally able woman, and one gifted physically, to make a living for herself and her brood and at the same time care for her home and rear her little ones properly. Some succeed, but most fall in this desperate and unfair struggle.

"It is the business of the citizens of Oregon to consider the rising generation. Conservation of mental, moral and physical health of our children is even more vital and important than the conservation of our other resources. This measure aims to make it possible for a widowed mother to keep her offspring under her own guidance and care until they are old enough to look out for themselves.

"And last, of all attention is directed to the expense. This is an important matter and one which taxpayers will scrutinize closely.

"This bill calls for a levy on property in each county of not more than one-tenth of a mill on each dollar. The framers of the bill have gone over this matter carefully, and confidently assert that such a measure will reduce instead of increasing the expense to the taxpayers of the state. Mothers know how to make dollars go a long way. What state institution can support an orphaned child for \$7.50 a month and give it decent clothing, sufficient food and proper training? Not one, neither in Oregon nor in any other state. It is an economical measure and will save more than it costs. It will pay, not only in higher ideals, and better citizenship, but in dollars and cents."

Taft to Open River Congress.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 3.—The annual meeting of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, which opens here tomorrow, promises to be one of the most notable gatherings ever assembled in the history of the United States in the interest of waterway development. The congress is national in its scope, representing all sections and all waterways, and is endeavoring to impress Congress with the necessity of a broad and comprehensive policy for improving rivers, harbors and canals of the nation. President Taft will deliver the opening address at the congress. Other men of note who will be heard during the three days' sessions are Secretary of War Stimson, Senator Simmons of North Carolina, Senator Townsend of Michigan, Senator Martin of Virginia, Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston, P. A. Pezet, the Peruvian minister to the United States, and Lieutenant Col. W. E. Anderson, chief engineer of the department of Marine and Fisheries of Canada.

General Otter's Retirement.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 3.—With the beginning of his seventieth year today, Major General William D. Otter, probably the most widely known officer in the Dominion military service, retires from the post of inspector general of Canadian militia. General Otter's career has been a long and distinguished one. He was born near Clinton, Ont., Dec. 3, 1842, and began his military career as a private in the Queen's Own Rifles of Toronto. In 1864 he was gazetted lieutenant, and from that time his rise was rapid. During the Fenian raid he was in command of the Queen's Own at the Lime Ridge action. In the Northwest rebellion he was in charge of the column that relieved Battleford. In 1899 he was given command of the first Canadian contingent raised for service in South Africa.

Legislation for Trainmen.

Harrisburg, Pa., Dec. 3.—The state legislative board of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, representing the largest body of organized trainmen in the country, held an important conference in this city today for the consideration of various measures of proposed legislation affecting the interests of railroad and other employees. An employers' liability bill was the principal matter discussed.

Federal Council of Churches Meets.
Chicago, Dec. 3.—As an introduction preliminary to the opening tomorrow of the second quadrennial meeting of the Federated Council of the Churches of Christ in America a conference of state and local federations was held here today at the Hotel La Salle. The quadrennial meeting of the Federal Council will open its session with a reception to the visiting delegates at Fullerton Hall, in the Art Institute, tomorrow evening. The Federal Council will remain in session until next Monday and the great interdenominational gathering will close with a banquet given by the social unions and church clubs of this city on Monday evening. Thirty-two denominational groups of churches in the United States are represented in the Federation, including a membership of nearly 17,000,000 communicants and many other adherents and supporters of the Federation outside of the regular churches. Bishop M. R. Hendrix of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, who is president of the council, will preside at the opening reception and will deliver an address on that occasion. He will also preside at the regular day meetings of the Council. On Thursday and Friday evenings public meetings will be held at Orchestra hall, at which noted speakers, among whom are Vice-President elect Thomas R. Marshall of Indiana, Dr. J. H. Jewett, of the Fifth avenue church, New York City, Francis B. Clark and others, will deliver addresses. On Sunday morning many of the delegates will preach in the various churches and in the afternoon a meeting of workingmen will be held in Orchestra hall, with Rev. Frank Mason North, of New York, presiding. International peace will be discussed by the delegates Monday morning and the "Supreme Mission of the Church" in the afternoon.

Sun Cult Leader to be Tried

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 3.—Preparations are being made for the trial in the federal court here next week of O'oman Tar Adusht Hanish, leader and founder of the Hazzadnan sun cult. Hanish is under four indictments, charging violations of the postal laws by sending of improper literature, including the "Inner Studies" through the mails.

The trial of the accused is awaited with considerable interest, inasmuch as the members of the cult are said to include maids and matrons of social prominence, not only in Chicago but in Massachusetts and in Canada, where Mazdaznan colonies have existed. Hanish, the founder of the cult, had led his followers to believe that he was born in Persia and was reared in a monastery by followers of Soroaster. As a matter of fact, it has been established that he is the son of Richard B. Hanish, an aged musician of Milwaukee, in poor circumstances.
