MARKETS CARRY PLENTY

AN ENORMOUS CLOSE ONLY DAY.

Supply of Meats and Vegetables Will Be Ample.

Unless there is going to be an unexpected eleventh hour rush at the stores the supplies will be ample to meet the demands tonight. This is not anticipated as the shopping has been constant and firm. Many of the birds are young ones which indicates that the market is being drained. It would argue that after the Christmas season the price will go up. However, after the feasting now in order, the demand will not be strong and the supply will go begging for a few months at least.

In the way of fresh vegetables for the Christmas table, never before has the supply equalled that of this year. This is due in a large measure to the great supply from local growers and the shipments made from Portland. The supply from the local greenhouse while limited at the present time is good and the stuffs that come from it are of the first grade. Lettuce, so important in the Christmas preparations could not be better and the offerings are readily taken at the best prices.

The meat markets are supplied with food of every description and the prices are not exorbitant. Fancy hams that deck the windows of the local shops are prizewinners, and would suit the tastes of the most exacting epicures. No change in quotations are recorded over those of yesterday.

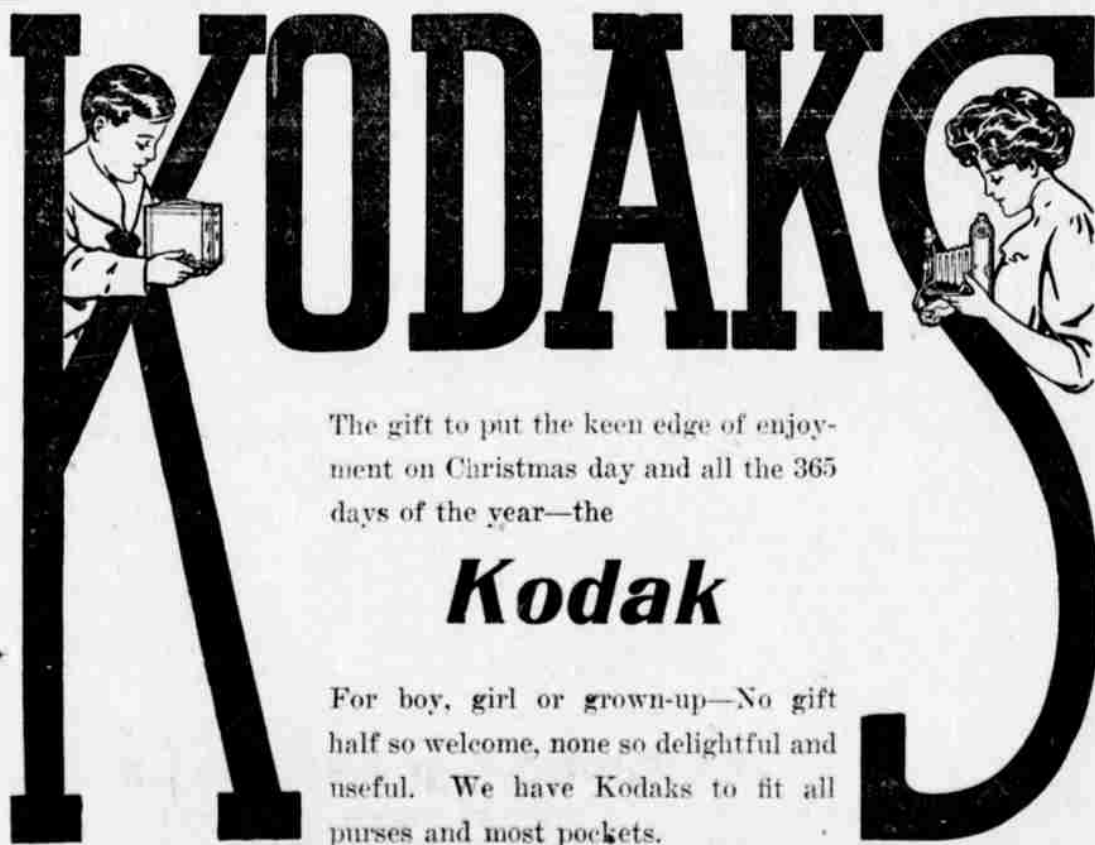
