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RYAN SENTENCED TO 7 YEARS AND HIS LIEUTENANTS DRAW FROM SIX TO ONE YEAR TERMS

Indianapolis, Dec. 30.—Frank M. Ryan, president of the Ironworkers' union today tops the list of convicted Ironworkers' heads and members as the man doomed to serve the longest sentence of all as a consequence of the conviction of 38 members of the union last Saturday morning. He must serve seven years. E. A. Clancy, Butler, Munsey, Young Hockin and others were sentenced by Judge Anderson to six years.

The 38 prisoners each handcuffed to a deputy were marched to the federal court house from the Marion county jail where they had been locked up since Saturday morning. The street crowds, accustomed to the scenes of the dynamite conspiracy trial took merely passing notice of the convicted men. Their path through the postoffice building to the court room on the second floor had been cleared.

The wives and relatives of the labor leaders and a few selected spectators were in the rooms. The same swivel chairs in which heretofore the men lolled under a presumption of innocence now served them when convicted. Between the body of the room and the defendants the deputies lined up two deep, cutting off much of the view of the prisoners' wives and relatives.

There were a few love messages loudly whispered by the wives and many were the loving glances exchanged. However, the court atmosphere and extra precaution discouraged a repetition of the pathetic scene which took place when the 38 were declared guilty Saturday.

When Judge Anderson, fresh from a conference with District Attorney Charles Miller, the prosecutor, had mounted the bench there was a dramatic silence. "Jimmy" Ray and Edward Smythe, of Peoria, stopped the "joshing" that brightened the march from jail.

John T. Butler, of Buffalo, another of "end men", was silent and did not even smile. Charles Wachmeister, of Detroit, was still suffering from nervousness brought on by his tearful breakdown in court Saturday.

When the prisoners took their places at 2:45, they appeared pale and nervous. Many wives and children wept in corridors. When the judge arrived, Miller moved for immediate sentences. Defense Attorney Kern motioned for a new trial and a stay of judgment but was overruled. The judge twice asked the defendants if they wanted to address the court. "I will never sentence a man I believe innocent regardless of a jury verdict," announced Judge Anderson, after denying the motion of the defense to stay judgment in the cases of the convicted men.

Prisoners were allowed to make

individual statements. Farrell was the first to respond. Anderson questioned him and the defendant declared he did not favor dynamitings and quit the union in 1908.

"If Farrell was opposed to dynamiting he should be entitled to consideration," the judge declared. District Attorney Miller stated his attitude toward Farrell has always been different and had the defense produced this evidence, "I certainly would have moved for Farrell's discharge." Cooney was then summoned. He declared he was a member of the Illinois bar and believed in the constitution of the country. "No evidence was presented," declared Miller, "showing Cooney was not implicated except by McManigal's statement. He and Cooney once discussed the dynamitings at Chicago. I am opposed to leniency. He talked too much." Murphy followed Cooney. Miller declared he felt Murphy was less guilty than the others.

Behart appealed for leniency but admitted he had aided in the conspiracy.

Before sentencing the defendants, the judge read the following statement:

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GUN VICTIM ON DEATHBED

PRESS MONTGOMERY CAN'T RE- COVER.

Two Children Here Are Rushed to
Asotin Where Father Is Dying.

Press Montgomery, shot some time ago at Lewiston in a quarrel with a fellow citizen of the ranges there, is dying at Asotin, Wn., and relatives here have taken the dying man's children to him. It appears Montgomery never recovered from the wounds inflicted in the battle which occurred a year or more ago, and has been gradually sinking until now word of his death is momentarily expected here.

His wife is not with him and two children have been cared for in this city. Sprat Montgomery and wife caring for the little boy. Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery have gone to Asotin with the children that they may be near their father in his dying hours. His condition since Saturday has not been communicated to local friends and relatives.

Whether or not Mrs. Montgomery will return to his bedside is not known. She is said to have left him soon after the shooting fracas and never returned to him.

BABIES BRING MERE PITTANCE ON THE MARTS

GERMAN WIDOW TRAFFICS IN
BABES AT \$3 TO \$10 FOR
EACH BABY

FAT ONES BRING MORE

Health Department Uncovers Wide-
spread Traffic in Babies in New
York—Women Foist Babies Upon
Unsuspecting Husbands—Often Re-
quired to Fatten Babies.

New York, Dec. 30.—Admitting she supplied a demand for babies at \$3.00 to \$10.00 each, Mrs. Dora Kemmin, a German widow, has disclosed widespread traffic in infants. The health department is investigating.

The woman declared she met the demand for babies from wives wishing to foist them on unsuspecting husbands. She declared the prospective customer was not required to give any reasons for purchases and she did not ask for references and received no promises of care for the infants.

The supply of babies greatly exceeds the demand because of the cost of living, she declared.

Occasionally she had to fatten the babies before selling them as some of her customers were particular about that—they also brought more when fat. She says she was within the law as she was paid for her trouble in procuring it and not for the baby itself.

GERMAN STATESMAN DEAD.

Germany Suffers Severe Blow in
Death of Prominent Official.

Berlin, Dec. 30.—Foreign Minister Von Kiderlin-Waechter died suddenly today at Stuttgart where he has been spending the holidays. The foreign office announced the death following a message to the minister's sister to the kaiser. The New Year's reception at the American embassy has been abandoned on account of the death, and also the illness of Lleschman.

Ambassadors Von Bernstorf of Washington, Wangenheim of Constantinople and others are among the prospective successors to Waechter. Owing to the acute situation of European affairs, diplomats regard the death as a serious blow to Germany.

PALZER A FAVORITE.

Ten to Nine Odds Offered on New
Year's Fight in the South.

Los Angeles, Dec. 30.—Palzer did light boxing today and tomorrow both men will rest. Outside money is making Palzer a ten to nine favorite—even money is predicted at ring time. Delegations are arriving from Reno, San Francisco, Kansas City, and Chicago. A thirty-five thousand dollar house is expected.

The fighters ended hard training yesterday and McCarthy's injured hand has healed. He is the local favorite.

Claimants of Potash Lake May Fight.

San Bernardino, Cal., Dec. 30.—Attorney Lee of San Francisco, representing claimants to the potash deposits of Searles Lake, is en route to the claims. He is accompanied by three men who are heavily armed and who have with them a gatling gun. Representatives of the California Trona company, adverse claimants, declare they will fight to prevent Lee from doing the necessary assessment work on the potash deposits. Sheriff Raph denies there is any trouble.

HOUSEHOLD GOODS TAXED

NEW LAW WILL NOT BENEFIT
UNTIL 1913.

County Clerk Wright Instructed to
Extend That Item.

Household furniture will be taxed in the 1913 assessment roll of Union county, even in the face of an attorney general opinion that the law adopted by initiative at the general election becomes effective at once. County Clerk Wright has been instructed by the state tax commission that the assessments made in 1912 must stand, and that the new law becomes effective only in the assessments made in 1913. County Clerk Wright has already extended much of the tax roll and it is now beyond his power to reduce the household tax—the only method now available would be for the sheriff to neglect to collect the household tax, and were such a procedure adopted the levy would be insufficient to meet the demands.

Comptroller Aids Probe.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 30.—It is announced that Attorney General Wickersham advised President Taft on Nov 9th that he be empowered to give the money trust network all the data in the possession of the comptroller of the currency, regarding the national banks.

Taft in Florida.

St. Augustine, Fla., Dec. 30.—President Taft breakfasted here today and autographed the city. He left at noon and his private car was packed with presents. He is expected to arrive at Washington at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning and plans to have a Christmas celebration at the white house.

Oregon Postoffice Robbed.

Medford, Dec. 30.—The postoffice at Talent, near here, was robbed Sunday night, but only a few dollars were taken. It is supposed to be the work of the same men entering the Medford postoffice Saturday, and the Eagle Point postoffice earlier in the week.

TURKEY WANTS PANAMA ACT

ALL OF MINISTRY SAVE ONE ARE
FOR PEACE.

Day Hastened When Powers' Ambassadors Shall Mediate in Balkans.

Constantinople, Dec. 30. — Turkey favors arbitration of the Balkan situation by ambassadors of the powers, it was learned today. The entire ministry with the exception of Kaimil Pasha desire peace.

London, Dec. 30.—It is understood here that the Turks have authorized their envoys to concede several points but retain Adrianople, at the session of the envoys this afternoon. Belgrade has instructed the Servians here to reject such a Turkish proposal. Some of the Balkans may insist on a resumption of war unless Turkey yields but it is believed the powers will intercede—in fact, the belief is prevalent that interference and arbitration by the powers will be the final and ultimate solution of the Balkan troubles.

AVALANCHE CRUSHES 15.

Carpenters and Employes Meet Death
at Crows' Nest Slide.

Seattle, Dec. 30.—Fifteen carpenters and employes at the Crows' Nest Coal company were crushed to death in an avalanche destroying their dwellings today.

Young Robbers Arrested

New York, Dec. 30.—Seven alleged safe crackers, all under 22 years of age, are under arrest here. It is believed they planned to blow up the safe of the Patrick Pennach Italian bank, usually holding more than \$300,000 in cash, on New Year's day.

Falls Six Stories.

San Francisco, Dec. 30.—Falling six stories and crashing through a skylight, Edward Hahnman and John Crawford were instantly killed today. A rope securing the painters at the seventh story of the Whitney building, slipped.

"400 ST" AIDS STRIKES WHO DON'T WANT AR PAINT

CLOSE TO ONE HUNDRED THOU-
SAND OUT IN NEW YORK
WAGE WAR.

MRS. BELMONT AMONG AIDS

Demands Asked for by Strikers Said
by Employers to Be Such as Would
Bankrupt the Owners—No Violence
Reported—Believed Federation of
Labor Is Behind the Strikers.

New York, Dec. 30.—Between 30,000 and 125,000 makers of men's and boys' outer garments struck this morning and more than 4000 shops and factories are affected. It is predicted the strike will soon include the women's waistmakers and dressmakers' unions. The strikers demand 20 per cent increase in wages, abolition of the curb contract system and a minimum wage scale of \$16.00 weekly for men and \$10.00 for women. They want time and a half for overtime and double time for holidays, clean and sanitary workshops.

Mrs. Rose, Pastor, Stolmes, O. H. P. Belmont and other prominent millionaire women are aiding the strikers. The Employers' association has predicted the strike will be a failure and it is declared some of the strikers will be afraid to appear. Fifty per cent of the regular force will not strike.

Employers blame agitators and declare the workmen's demands would bankrupt hundreds of the smaller concerns.

Relief work for the strikers is being organized and representatives of the strike committee met the workers at the factory doors and conducted them to headquarters where rallies progressed throughout the day. No violence is reported and it is said that the American Federation of Labor is backing the strikers.

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 30.—Despite storms, the suffragettes marching here from New York, aroused themselves early. "Rain has not changed our plans," declared the leader, Rosalie Jones. "Our sentinels await Governor-elect Sulzer to escort him from the depot to the hotel." Tens and receptions and a rally this evening is the program for the marchers who came here from New York on foot to appeal for votes for women.
