ORDINANCE NO. 689, SERIES 1912.

An ordinance authorizing all water rents to be paid at the office of the water department to the water superintendent and providing for a bond to be given to the city by such superintendent for the faithful performance of the duties of his office.
The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:
Section 1. That all water rents, together with all deposits, penalties and other charges authorized by Ordinance No. 516, series 1911, and all other moneys that the city of La Grande is authorized to collect, for whatsoever purpose in connection with the management and control of its water system, shall be payable at the office of the water department to the water superintendent unless otherwise ordered.
Section 2. The water superintendent before entering upon the discharge of such office shall give to the city, to insure the faithful discharge of the duties of said office, a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$2,000.00, said bond to be approved by the mayor.
Section 3. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of January, 1912, provided that before said date the same shall be approved by the mayor and published in one issue of The Evening Observer.
Passed the council this 31st day of December, 1912, by seven councilmen voting therefor.
