ORDINANCE NO. 689, SERIES 1912

All ordinance authorizing all wa-
ter rents to be paid at the office of
the water department to the water
superintendent and providing for a
bond to be given to the city by such
superintendent for the faithful per-
formance of the duties of his office.
The city of La Grande does ordain
as follows:

Section 1. That all water rents,
together with all deposits, penalties
and other charges authorized by Or-
dinance No. 516, series 1911, and all
other moneys that the city of La
Grande is authorized to collect, for
whatsoever purpose in connection
with the management and control of
its water system, shall be payable at
the office of the water department to
the water superintendent unless other-
wise ordered.

Section 2. The water superinten-
dent before entering upon the dis-
charge of such office shall give to
the city, to insure the faithful dis-
charge of the duties of said
office, a good and sufficient bond in the sum
of \$2,000.00, said bond to be approp-
riated by the mayor.

Section 3. That all ordinances and
parts of ordinances in conflict hereto-
with are hereby repealed. This or-
dinance shall be in full force and
effect from and after the 1st day of
January, 1912, provided that before
said date the same shall be approved
by the mayor and published in an
issue of The Evening Observer.

of December, 1912, by seven council-
men voting therefor.
