### IRRIGATORS IN PORTLAND

**Second Annual Irrigation Congress Convenes Tomorrow.**

Portland, Ore., Jan. 8.—(Special)—The stage is set and everything in readiness for the Second Oregon Irrigation congress to be held in Portland Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. Acceptances from speakers are coming in well so it seems the program as made up will be carried out with but few changes.

The auditorium at the Imperial hotel will be the meeting place for the congress and delegates so far heard from insure a representative attendance from all parts of Oregon where irrigation is a live subject.

The congress will be extremely practical in its nature, the chief aim of the program committee having been to arrange a group of subjects that have a direct application of the present-day conditions in this state and arrangements have been made to have them discussed by men having a thorough grasp on these topics. From the time the gavel falls at the opening of the congress Thursday morning until the last speech at the banquet Saturday night, there will be nothing that is not worth while.

**Women Build Smudges.** Pomona, Cal., Jan. 8.—Smudge fires in this section are said to have saved the greater portion of the fruit crop. Women aided in keeping the fires

burning during all of the night. The total damage to fruit will not be estimated for a week.

**Twenty Millions Is Crop Loss** Los Angeles, Jan. 8.—Estimates of the loss to fruit put it at from 40 to 60 per cent of the entire crop. Twenty

millions will hardly cover it. The price of beans and small vegetables is soaring as a result of the losses to truck gardens. An endeavor will be made to thaw a part of the frozen fruit to save it for some kind of commercial purpose.
