The summer institute of Willamette university will be held in the future at Wallowa lake, according to an announcement made recently in Portland. This year the sessions will be held in Joseph, it is expected, but after quarters are established on the lake, the meetings will be taken there says a Wallowa county paper.

The institute will be conducted in July and August, after the teachers have taken their spring state examinations.

Credit for bringing institute to the county is largely given to F. D. McCully of Joseph, a trustee of the Willamette university.

SNOW NOT A BIRD ENEMY

REPORT THAT PHEASANTS SUFFER, UNTRUE.

Local Gun Clubs Stand Ready to Aid The Birds.

It was reported that pheasants have been in danger of extermination on account of the snow. C. B. Oral, game warden for this section says the report is without foundation, since the snow is not interfering with the birds in their effort to find food. There is much illicit hunting of these birds and the real danger is from men who have no respect for the law. It will be practically impossible to protect the birds if the individual hunter has no regard for the law or the breeding season. Another announcement coming from the warden is that pertaining to the care which the local gun clubs of the city are exercising for the feeding of the birds in bad weather. He states that all of the men stand ready with the means to keep them alive and are careful about infractions of the law. With this report comes another that will add joy to the heart of the hunter.

Owing to the fact that the herds of Elk in Yellowstone park are growing so large that the problem of feeding them in the winter season is becoming burdensome to the federal government, carloads of them are to be distributed throughout the western states and elsewhere. Several carloads will be turned loose in the Wallowa country and adjacent territory, where they will find enough grass to feed themselves.

With the proper protection until they have multiplied to such extent that they will not be subject to extermination, the forests of Eastern Oregon should once more resound with the bellow of the stately elk.

Morgan Buys More Land.

Thomas Morgan, who recently traded 80 acres of the old Watson place on Alder slope to F. I. Vergere for Home Independent Telephone stock, has turned over part of this stock in exchange for 80 acres four miles from La Grande. The tract is also four miles from Mr. Morgan's 800 acre farm in the Grande Ronde. Mr. Morgan has a big traction engine which pulls 12 plows, turning over a strip 15 feet wide at a time. With this equipment 540 acres were plowed late in the fall, and 320 acres of fall grain have been put in on the farm. Mr. Morgan is thinking of bringing the power plowing outfit to Wallowa county next summer.—Enterprise Record-Chief.
