President Eccles of the Mt. Hood railroad, lumber king and relative of the late sugar king, passed through the city this morning on his way to Baker.

Ray T. Zollinger arrived in La Grande yesterday from Portland, where he accompanied his father and mother on their way to Los Angeles. He leaves tonight for Des Moines, Iowa.

H. A. Peterson and G. B. Kerth, well-known traveling passenger agents of the Milwaukee and O.W. lines, were in the city last night, looking after business for their companies.

J. H. Smith, working for the Grande Rondo Meat company, went to Nampa, Idaho, this morning in the interest of the company. Most of the stock consumed in La Grande comes from Idaho on account of the shortage in this valley. Nearly all of it has been contracted for ahead of time.

J. F. Berg who has been in the city buying hides, left this morning for Pendleton. He succeeded in getting a carload of green hides. "Owing to the poor condition at this time of the year hides are somewhat low," said he, "and the prospect is for little change in price."

Ten members of the Hollowell Orchestra company arrived in La Grande from the east to play for the Elks ball tonight. They are from Chicago and have been on the road since October. There is one lady in the company who handles the traps and drums. Chas. Lowery is the conductor. John Louetta, the harpist, is a musician of some note.

E. S. Norris, president of the Co-operative association, went to Imbler this morning to attend an adjourned meeting of the association. He states the next store will be established at Elgin and that there are at the present time 70 subscribers to the stock of the company at that place. Business has been good and they anticipate planting a number of stores in the valley.

B. R. Mead, well known in this section as a pioneer timber cruiser and estimator, returned to Sumpter this morning to follow his line of work. He has been in the business since 1866 and knows practically every foot of ground in these counties. He estimates there will be no lumber in this section of the country in fifty years at the present rate of consumption.

John and George Oldenburg of Hermiston were passengers to Pendleton this morning. The Oldenburg family were at one time residents of the Grande Ronde valley and are well known here. The head of the family had the distinction of having shipped the first carload of apples from this valley. They made it quite a business, shipping to points away from La Grande, going as far as California and other southern points. They have retired from active farm life and have made Portland their home.
