ROADS, TAXATION AND OTHER IMPORTANT JOBS GIVEN.

Forestrom and McDonald Get Several Committee Appointments.

Union and Wallawa counties obtained two good committee appointments and a number of minor ones in the list of house committees named by Speaker McArthur of the Oregon house.

Here are some of the committees named: Roads and Highways—Pierce, GIB, McDonald, Nichols, Spencer, Thomas, Westerland.

Elections—Hall, Eaton, Forestrom, Hagood, Loifgren.

Engrossed Bills—Massey, Forestrom, Latourrette.

Assessment and Taxation—Forestrom, Barton, Blanchard, Leughlin, Spencer.

Railways and Transportation—Reames, Bonebrake, Forestrom, Massey, Nurnane.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 16.—(Special)—These bills were introduced in the house yesterday.

H. B. No. 37, by Schuebel (request)—To repeal 1911 law providing for publishing of delinquent tax list in newspapers.

H. B. No. 38, by Howard—To provide for instruction in manners and morals and sexual hygiene in grammar and high schools.

H. B. No. 59, by Meek—To regulate sale, use and possession of blasting powder, fuses caps and other explosives.

H. B. No. 60, by Murnane—Fixing number and compensation of deputies of city assessor in Multnomah county.

H. B. No. 61, by Hagood—To authorize state board of control to provide through cooperation with counties in municipalities on heat, light power and water.

H. B. No. 62, by Hagood—Appropriating \$500,000 for Panama-Pacific exposition.

H. B. No. 63, by Hagood—Providing secretary to governor at \$5,000 annual salary.

H. B. No. 64, by Blanchard—Providing for southern Oregon agricultural societies.

H. B. No. 65, by Bonebrake—To

prohibit railroad grade crossings except by consent of railroad commission.

H. B. No. 44, by Nichols—To prohibit live stock from running at large on a public highway.

H. B. No. 67, by Blanchard—To abolish statutory requirement for use of private seals in execution of deeds, mortgages and powers of attorney.

H. B. No. 68, by Blanchard—Naming certain classes exempt from jury duty.

H. B. No. 49, by Lawelling (request)—To sterilize habitual criminals and pervers.

H. B. No. 70, by Hill—To require returning corporations to file statements with secretary of state.

H. B. No. 71, by Blanchard—To prohibit minors from playing cards, billiards, pool or taking part in games of chance in places of resort.

H. B. No. 72, by Blanchard—Regulating sale of aged and rancid butter.

H. B. No. 73, by Abbott—To provide details surveys and investigations of water resources of Oregon.

H. B. No. 74, by Upton—To regulate how wages shall be paid to employes.

H. B. No. 75, by Upton—To repeal indeterminate sentence law.

H. B. No. 76, by Upton—To make a wife or husband competent witness in criminal actions where the other is accused by consent of both.

H. B. No. 77, by Upton—Exempting certain persons from jury duty.

H. B. No. 78, by Upton—To punish threats to kill, and purchase of weapon pursuant thereto, by 1 to 10 years in the penitentiary.
