# VEGETABLES IN DEMAND

WALLA WALLA IS ONLY OUTSIDE SOURCE.

Wheat Going up and Flour Remains as Yesterday Here.

There is a scarcity of fresh green vegetables in the local market. Portland can supply but little more for the season, and what vegetables are to be had come from Walla Walla, Washington. The price is rather

steep and green things may be considered a luxury. Two cars of Oregon onions were shipped to the orient.

Oranges Almost Consumed.

The supply of oranges in the warehouses on Front street in Portland is about exhausted and in about two week's time there will be none on the local market, unless they have been contracted for far ahead of time.

Fresh eggs are down to 40 cents in the La Grande grocery stores.

Cattle and Hogs Steady.

There is little change in the price of cattle, the best being quoted at 8 cents. Hogs on the Portland market and 7 cents on the home market. Hogs have been selling at the same price, \$7.60, and a little better for

the best grades. There was a time when the percentage of steer beef on the market was less than 50 per cent. At the present time this percentage has risen and not less than from 70 to 75 per cent of the meat on the local counters is steer beef. Flour Remains Still.

The advance in wheat has not affected the price of flour in the La Grande market. Almost all of the principal markets of the world have sent the price of Bluestem up more than five cents for the last week, but it has not had any appreciable effect on the local market and the change will not come for some few days on account of supplies on hand. When the change does come it will put a different price on bran, shorts and other feeds that are made of wheat, rise in the price of this principal foodstuff and the prediction that before long the price will go to a dollar is not visionary. Much of the wheat that was sold during the summer and fall months is going to realize for its purchasers a handsome profit.
