CHERRY'S GREATEST ENEMY.

(Cherry Gummosis and Its Control Described in Lecture.)

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 13.—That Cherry gummosis is the greatest enemy of the sweet cherry especially in the moister sections of the state, and that it may be controlled and prevented by right methods was emphasized in a lecture by H. P. Baras before students of the short course at the Oregon Agricultural College this morning.

"The greatest enemy to the culture of the sweet cherry in Oregon is a disease which produces great damage and loss in the moister sections of the state," said Mr. Baras. "This disease is usually accompanied by a more or less copious exudation of gum, and from this fact is commonly called cherry gummosis.

"Upon examining trees which show gumming, spots or areas of the bark are discovered to be dead and brown down to the wood. It is really a bark disease. Bacteria are found in these dead or dying areas of bark. Inoculation of healthy trees with the pure cultures of these bacteria results in the production of gum at the inoculated spot.

"It seems probable, therefore, that the disease is a bacterial bark disease. The death of trees, limbs or twigs is due to girdling by the disease, and may occur at almost any time of the year.

"The disease can be controlled by cutting out and thoroughly all dead bark and sterilizing the wood with corrosive sublimate (strength 1-1000). Beginning when trees are very young they should be inspected from time to time for a number of years for the dead spots of bark, and these should be cut out at once.

"The disease can be prevented on the trunk and in the crotch of the tree by using the Mazzard seedling as a body and grafting or budding the commercial varieties on the limbs at two or three years of age. The Mazzard is resistant to the disease and unites perfectly with our sweet cherries."

HILL FOUND GUILTY.

Third Trial Convicts Horse Thief Captured at La Grande.

After having his case submitted to three different juries by three different prosecuting officers Lynn Hill of Elgin has been convicted at Pendleton of the crime of horse stealing, the last jury returning a verdict of guilty after deliberating for less than an hour. The verdict was brought in late yesterday afternoon and Friday was set by the court as the date for the passing of sentence, states a Pendleton paper.

Hill was implicated with Charles Modrell in the larceny of horses from several south-end stockmen last summer and the two were arrested at La Grande, whether they had driven the stolen animals. Modrell pleaded guilty and was sentenced to the penitentiary but Hill, maintaining that he was hired by his companion to assist in driving the animals, stoutly maintained his innocence. Both of the previous juries dis-

agreed, the majority in the first, it is said, holding out for acquittal and in the second for conviction. People acquainted with the case seem to think that Hill was the ringleader in the affair but was clever enough to throw the burden of the blame upon Modrell.

District Attorney Frederick Stelwer is today receiving the congratulations of his friends upon the outcome of the trial and for his able manner in presenting the case to the jury. It is his first case since taking office and the fact that two other efforts to convict the accused man had failed is evidence enough of the difficulties which had to be overcome.
