SALOON BILL  
SCARES MANY

EASTERN OREGON TOWNS WOULD  
FEEL BLOW.

Measure Which Is Remedy in Port-  
land Would Strike Many.

A hard blow would be dealt to the liquor interests of Pendleton, La Grande and Baker should the bill introduced in the senate by Senator Hoskins prohibiting the sale of liquor within three hundred feet of a railway station become a law. In La Grande at least three would move.

While aimed at the three saloons in the Oregon Electric station at Portland, it would affect seven of the twelve saloons in Pendleton and the only three restaurants there which hold licenses to sell liquor.

In legal circles there is some doubt as to the authority of the legislature to enact such a law because of certain constitutional amendments which limit the power of the state over municipal corporations. One of these amendments is the so-called Home Rule law adopted two years ago which to a certain extent, gives cities the right to regulate their own liquor traffic. Another is an amendment aimed to prevent the assumption of power by the state in regulating municipal affairs. Whether or not these amendments take away the police power of the state is a question for legal minds to decide.

At least one Baker saloon would be forced to move.
