QUARREL ENDS IN COURT.

Summerville People Have Dispute Over Account.

Wm. Buchanan of Summerville has been charged with the crime of assault with a dangerous weapon. The preliminary hearing was held yesterday and the defendant waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury. According to his statement he had work for a Mr. Smith of that place and had due him a sum of money. Meeting the mother and the son on the road one day he asked them for the money and was refused. An altercation ensued in which both parties are said to have passed rough words to one another and threatened to make things interesting. The young man who was mounted got off his horse and approached his opponent. The latter backed away, but Smith took off his coat and threw it over the head of Buchanan, endeavoring thereby to put the latter at a disadvantage. It is said, Buchanan threw the coat off and Smith repeated the operation. On removing the coat the second time he was considerably startled to see pointed toward him a revolver, which Buchanan held in his hand pointed towards Smith. This is said to be the cause of the charge. Several local men went on the \$100 bond of the defendant and he will be at liberty until the grand jury and the court have disposed of the case.

Many Excuses in Darrow Case

Los Angeles, Jan. 21.—Impanelling a jury for the second trial of Clarence Darrow is going to be beset with more difficulty than the first. The men called on to do jury work are making all kinds of excuses.

Some have asked to be excused on the ground of being on the point of making a world tour, others are compelled to work on the ranch to ward off bankruptcy on account of the damage to oranges and lemons by the recent frost.

Darrow is personally quizzing the prospective jurors, paying particular attention to their opinions regarding union labor.

St. Paul, Jan. 21.—"I have come to Minnesota to forget the past and to make good in the future." This was the declaration made by Foulke E. Brandt, recently pardoned by Governor Sulzer of New York after serving six years of a 30 year sentence for burglarizing the home of Mortimer Schiff, the New York millionaire. Senator Nelson of Minnesota personally promised to look after Brandt's future.
