

Young Turks Upset Peace Plans

NAZIM PASHA SHOT DOWN BY YOUNG TURKS

ALL EUROPE IN UPROAR WHEN TURKEY LOSES ITS GOVERNMENT.

NEW CABINET INSTALLED

Without Forewarning Young Turks Spring Upon New Cabinet and Forcefully Create New Cabinet—Envoys to London Recalled—Ambassadors to Be Court Martialed, Too.

Constantinople, Jan. 24.—Out of the apparent certainty of peace in the Balkans has arisen a momentous revolt by Young Turks, and a new cabinet exists. The first official act of the new cabinet after recalling the envoys from the London peace meeting, was to recall the Turkish ambassadors to Vienna and St. Petersburg, for court martial. The ambassadors are accused of not maintaining a strong policy in behalf of Turkey against the Balkans. All hope for peace is dissipated. It means the Young Turks are determined to prosecute war despite the warnings of the powers and the decision of the former Turkish government to come to peace.

Wholesale arrests have been made but as the prisons were filled last night, no one knows what to do with the prisoners, and mobs are liberating them as fast as they are incarcerated elsewhere.

The greatest danger now seen is that any moment the massacre of Christians may begin which will force armed intervention by the powers.

London, Jan. 24.—Dispatches from Constantinople since the resignation of the ministry are being subjected to a rigorous censorship and the diplomats are uncertain whether the information concerning the developments are authentic or not. From semi-official sources it is learned that the British office believes the Young Turks forcibly ejected the Kaimil ministry. Official confirmation of the killing of Nazim Pasha by Enver Bey has been received. Two other officers are said to have been slain.

To Prevent European Embroilment. Sir Edward Grey called together the ambassadors to consider steps to prevent the embroilment of the other European powers in the Balkan struggle. Grey told them that vigorous action by the powers is imperative to avoid the most serious consequences that will follow the Turkish revolution.

STILL-BORN BABE AND FATHER-LESS ONE CHANGED

MOTHER CONFESSES

Slingsby Millions in England Not the Property of Supposed Child.

Indianapolis, Jan. 24.—Legal machinery has been put into motion to establish whether the supposed child of Lieut. Slingsby and wife of England, is the legitimate heir to the Slingsby millions. A Mrs. Fred Certain, of this city, formerly Miss Lillian Anderson of Weaverville, California, was induced by Dr. W. W. Fraser of Weaverville to part with her illegitimate child. The doctor promised to provide a good home for the child. Several months later the doctor informed the mother that he had substituted her child for a still born child born to Mrs. Slingsby.

Mrs. Certain in a statement today declared that, to the best of her knowledge, the child now posing as the infant of Mrs. Slingsby, was her own illegitimate son, and that it was born on the 19th of September, 1910. According to her statement there was nothing crooked about the transfer and that she had received no money for her child.

If this statement of facts is true, and if the child now supposed to be the child of Mrs. Slingsby, is not her child, the property will go to other relatives of Mrs. Slingsby.

Daneff Sees War Ahead.

"Apparently the only course to pursue will be to go to war," said Dr. Daneff, who has been hoping the war would end amicably without another struggle. "We must acquire forcibly what we hoped to secure peaceably. This will include Adrianople and the Aegean islands."

This voiced declaration of Daneff is said to be the silent belief of the foreign ambassadors.

Pasha's Death Sudden.

Constantinople, Jan. 24.—Nazim Pasha, the former war minister and commander of the Turkish army, was shot dead in a demonstration which preceded the resignation of the cabinet yesterday morning.

Enver Bey and Talaat Bey had given explicit orders that no blood should be shed. But Nazim Pasha's aide-de-camp fired from a window of the porte at Enver Bey and his companion and they returned the fire.

Their bullets killed Nazim Pasha himself. In spite of this tragedy, there was no disturbance of order elsewhere.

The crisis in Turkish affairs came yesterday evening with dramatic suddenness. The grand vizier, Kaimil Pasha, and the Ottoman cabinet resigned and Mahammed Shekfat Pasha formerly minister of war and commander of the constitutional army which enthroned Mehmed V as sultan was appointed grand vizier.

The day previous the grand council pronounced in favor of peace almost at any price. Last evening a vast crowd drawn from all classes declared for war, rather than peace without Adrianople. And because the crowd was backed by general public opinion, the government surrendered and relinquished office, making way for the same men whom the popular movement brought to the top after the revolutions of 1908 and 1909.

Boise, Jan. 24.—Former Governor Brady of Idaho has been elected today to fill out the unexpired term of Senator Heyburn, who died recently. For a long time it seemed as if the fight would eliminate both Brady and Babb from the race but the Brady forces would not listen to any elimination talk, owing to the fact that their candidae had led in the ballot-

ing from the start. Brady openly challenged his opponents to caucus, claiming that if he took his chances with the rest of the candidate, he would get the majority. This ends a contest that has been uppermost in the minds of the Idaho legislators and allows the house and senate to devote their time to regular legislation.

CHRISTIANS FACE TO FACE WITH DANGERS

EUROPE TREMBLES AT PROBABLE CONSEQUENCES OF REVOLUTION.

RIOTING NOW RAMPANT

Triple Alliance May Forget Differences and Act—Need of Troops in Constantinople Is Pressing—Outbreak Against Christians Expected—Momentarily Agree Critics.

Berlin, Jan. 24.—"Turks stand with torches at the powder magazine and there will be wild work elsewhere than in the Tehatalja lines unless prompt measures are taken to restrain them."

This is the comment voiced by leading Berlin papers and it accurately sums up the Turkish situation as viewed in Berlin. Government officials are depressed over the latest turn of affairs. They have practically abandoned hope that the Young Turks will cede either Adrianople or the Aegean sea islands.

Austrian Troops Held.

Vienna, Jan. 24.—In view of the danger of general European difficulties as the result of the Turkish revolution, plans for the mobilization of the Austrian troop have been abandoned.

St. Petersburg Alarmed

St. Petersburg, Jan. 24.—Suggestions that the triple alliance and triple entente forget its difference immediately and intervene in Turkey are reported sent to the foreign offices of European powers by Russian officials.

Constantinople, Jan. 24.—Thousands of Asiatic troops have crossed the Bosphorus into European Turkey last night and today. Three hundred thousand Asiatic soldiers have been brought here from Asiatic Turkey since the armistice was signed.

Young Turks boast military command of Constantinople and also assume the title of chief of staff of the Turkish forces.
