## AGENTS FIND PLENTY WORK

### REDUCTION IN INSURANCE RATES HUGE TASK.

One Office Alone Has Five Hundred  
Policies to Re-Write.

Local insurance offices are busy  
complying with the recent insurance  
reduction rates, as ascertained by  
the Underwriters' equitable rating  
bureau. This new system is in com-  
pliance with the laws of the state of  
Oregon and effects only the city of La  
Grande because of her fire-fighting  
facilities and does not effect the rates  
applying to property outside of the  
corporate limits of the city.

The reduction will effect all monies  
paid on policies from the 15th of No-  
vember of 1912. Many of the sums are  
for 30 cents and up to a dollar, but the  
refunding clause will cause to be re-  
paid as high as \$11.00 in some instan-  
ces. It is entailing a great amount of  
work. Notices, with the change indi-  
cated will have to be mailed to each  
policy holder. A check will have to be  
mailed for the refund and when this  
is done the entries will have to be  
made in the ledger. The La Grande  
Investment company alone has about  
500 policies that will be affected by  
the reduction. The average refund  
will amount to \$2.00. When all is  
said and done the companies and the  
insurance agents will have to make  
another deal regarding commissions  
and the like. Six days work in the  
office alone will be required to finish  
the work. When all the offices have  
complied with the new rating some  
thousands of dollars will come back  
to La Grande property owners.

### Armenians Are Fastidious.

About 60 Armenians were induced  
to come to La Grande by a Portland  
labor agency under the promise that  
the company here would supply them  
with work on the steel gang. On  
their arrival they found out that the  
company wanted them for other pur-  
poses and they refuse to go to work.  
They immediately made arrange-  
ments with their foreman to go back  
to Portland where they will demand  
the return of \$3.00 each, the price  
paid the agency for the job. Their  
baggage consisted of a great bundle  
of blankets, mattresses and a few  
clothes. The men were well dressed  
and speak broken English.

### Walters' Strike Spreads.

New York, Jan. 25.—Service in 30  
big hotels is crippled by the spread  
of the strike. Thousands are out  
and leaders predict that 70,000 others  
will go out in three days.
