Navajo Blue Spots. It has been noticed by scientists who have been studying the interesting and mysterious Navajo Indians that the Navajo baby invariably has a blue spot at the base of its spine. The spot is sometimes as small as a dime and sometimes as big as one's hand. It closely resembles a bruise, but it is due entirely to an extraordinary pigmentation. The spot may disappear before the child is five years old, but always returns later in life when this is the case. The scientists have come to the conclusion that this spot is proof positive of the Mongolian origin of the Navajo. And they also make the astonishing assertion that it is present in many European and American children whose parents can trace their genealogy for generations back and are certain that there has been no admixture of Mongolian blood.—Exchange.
