Baumgardner according to the complaint and order, has money in the La Grande National bank.

The husband himself is having a peck of trouble for when given a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Patterson yesterday afternoon, he was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, the said weapon being a long-bladed pocket knife, which was produced in court as evidence. His bond was set in the sum of \$1000.
