disease was made known, has had a very light attack, but Mrs. Phelps and her sister escaped entirely.

"The new Western State asylum, of which Dr. W. D. McNary is superintendent, is a magnificent up-to-date building. The present legislature is asked to provide funds for a sewage plant. The sewage now empties into the Umatilla river."

TYPHOID IS FEARED

Dr. White Warns Pendleton That Typhoid May Spread Seriously.

Sounding a warning to Pendleton and Umatilla county, State Health Officer Calvin White has issued an interview in the Pendleton Live Wire urging extreme care to prevent a spread of typhoid in Umatilla county. The Live Wire says:

"In the interview Dr. White discussed the general health conditions and local prospects. He said that he was afraid that Umatilla county is going to have some trouble with typhoid this coming season, unless steps are taken in regard to the water supply. The fact that the sewage waters of Pendleton, the Eastern Oregon hospital and numerous small towns all drain into the river and this water is taken out in the irrigation ditches makes every one of these ditches a great storage reservoir for typhoid germs, and persons living or working in the irrigated districts will drink more or less from the open ditches thus taking the typhoid bacillus into the system. There is a law on the statute books of the state which makes its compulsory for a city or town using an opening running stream as an outlet for the sewage to first run the sewage water through a septic tank and thus remove these germs but it is not generally observed. "The sewage from the Eastern Oregon state hospital will be run through the septic tank as soon as it can be constructed, but as all the money appropriated was used for building purposes before the legislature convened, this very essential improvement was held up and will probably not be completed in time to do much good for the down river districts this year.

\$500 Fine Every Five Days.

"So far as the towns are concerned while the law places a penalty of \$500 for each offense and makes every five days a separate offense, yet few towns have yet put in the required tank, and Pendleton is one of the towns that has not. Hence the sewage water goes straight into the river for the benefit (?) of these living below.

"The question comes up as to how long the typhoid germ will live in running water, and the answer is indefinite. It is known that it will live in a block of ice for 30 days. If it would live that long in running water, a stream running one mile per hour would carry the germ 720 miles and it would still be in good, healthy condition. The state board of health entered a suit a short time ago against the town of Silverton to force it to put in a septic tank, thinking the matter would be resisted, and a supreme court decision could be secured to establish the right of the board in the matter, but the town fooled the board by installing the system without appealing to the courts.

Will Build Big Plant.

A. J. McLeod, proprietor of the Wardrobe announces that he will in the course of this month install in the Oregon Hotel building a modern dry cleaning and dye works establishment. The new plant will consist of a power room containing a motor and a high pressure boiler with which he will operate his dyers, dry cleaning apparatus and distilling tanks.
