WINTER FEED HOLDING OUT

STOCK INSPECTOR FINDS STOCK IN GOOD SHAPE.

Deep Snow Keeps Stock Bunched Near Feeding Grounds.

January, 1913, the coldest month, usually, and the most disastrous to live stock, left no ill effects in Union county, declares County Stock Inspector P. A. Charlton.

"There has been no contagion," his monthly report declares, "and stock has been well fed. The winter storms came on suddenly driving the stock to the feed sheds and kept them there as at no time was their opportunity for stock to stray off to the hills again, and there be nabbed by sudden snow storms. There has been plenty of hay to feed and good feed, too. Though unusually deep snow covers the ranches, there has been practically no losses in stock circles from severe winter snows."

"Horse shipments have been steady and good throughout January, the customary prices prevailing, about 11 carloads going out."

"Hog raising and shipping has rapidly become a very remunerative industry of the valley and the past winter has seen more hog shipping for the simple reason that there are more hogs raised," concludes the inspector.

case, the city's counsel moved that no evidence be admitted; that the move to be made by the plaintiff was to sue for damages and not ejectment. The court overruled this motion, however, and the case went to trial with City Attorney Roscoe Nell the first witness. To establish the fact that the pipe was uncovered in places and to set 20 inches at the maximum height above the earth, was his chief results and on cross examination said the pipe was covered to a depth of about one foot in places, especially in front of the first parcel of the land after the railroad track was crossed.

Ex-Mayor Church, Councilman Jones Water Superintendent Hoyt and others will testify for the city before the case is finished.

TWO MEN ALREADY IN CUSTODY

One Stole Bed Sheets and the Other Smoked Meats.

Two true bills were returned by the grand jury this morning and as a consequence pleadings in these two indictments will come tomorrow forenoon. Both of those indicted by this batch of true bills are in custody and were immediately arraigned. The grand jury is still in session.

J. H. Morrissey is indicted with the crime of stealing bed sheets and other similar goods from the Savoy hotel, all amounting to a sum of \$9.80. He has no means to procure counsel and the county will pay Attorney Dixon for defending him.

Chas. Peterson was arraigned on a charge of stealing some smoked beef, and he, too, cannot afford to employ counsel and Attorney Small will defend him. Both will plead tomorrow.

These two cases were the only ones reported during the forenoon.
