FIRE DEPARTMENT PROMULGATES REGULATIONS.

No One but Fire Department Members and Two Others Allowed.

VOLUNTEERS GIVEN \$25.00. A donor whose name is unknown, contributed \$25 to the volunteer fire department for its efforts in preventing a spread of fire in the shacks on Jefferson two weeks ago. President Suydam publicly expresses the appreciation of the companies for the donation.

Stringent regulations governing the fire truck and the number of people who may ride on it during runs to fires, have been laid down by the fire department. Fire Chief Benham has promulgated the following rules which will be closely adhered to hereafter: Only members of the volunteers, one policeman, one newspaper representative, and one member of the water works, will be allowed on the truck going to fire and return; the public is not only forbidden but will be prosecuted if violating these rules. This applies both coming and going to fires.

Positively no bystanders will be permitted between the auto truck and the fire—policemen are asked to enforce this rule.

Automobiles following the fire truck are warned that they must keep in safe territory. The car is liable to stop on a back up at any time.

The safest way to avoid injury is not to keep in close proximity to the car.

Following the text of the resolution adopted by the farmers' union calling upon the legislature to take steps towards a probe of the grain bag trust:

To the Oregon state legislature, now in session, Salem, Oregon: The Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union of America begs to call your attention that it appears from reliable information that the price of 1913 grain bags is immoderately high, and frequent raises in prices reported by dealers, and that the jute crop for 1912 was as large as that of the year 1907, the former high water mark in the production of jute, and that there was carried over in the Puget Sound country from last year more than 3,000,000 bags, thus indicating that shortage of raw material and reserved manufactured product cannot be the cause of the present
