# MILTON FIVE LOSES GAME

FIRST DEFEAT OF PRESENT TRIP IS FELT.

Y Team Drops Baskets Regularly Enough to Win With Safe Margin.

Milton's Columbia college fell before the Y. M. C. A. onslaught last night at the "Y" gym to the tune of 35 to 28. To win the Y quintet had to overcome a Milton lead of one point at the end of the first session but a beautiful spurt of old-time speed that lasted for two, or three minutes at the beginning of the second semester carried the home guard eight or ten points to the good, and though a rally of form and speed on Milton's part late in the game brought the margin down to four points the rally was short lived and the home guard worked itself into a substantial lead at the last. Neither team was in good form and loose playing prevailed through a greater portion of the game—made loose, largely, through the fact that the floor is opened at both ends and "ball out" requirements necessarily slowed up the playing persistently.

Henderson, Hudson and Storm were the brilliant luminaries for the visitors, Henderson slipping down the long floor on well executed team plays to drop in baskets three times. Storm has lost his cunning of last year insofar as feeding in the baskets are concerned for he missed several at close range, and again two of his throws were from long slanting angles. But his foot work was of the same old form. Inaccurate passing and fumbling proved costly to both teams during the process of the game but, as said, the frequent out of bounds befuddled the players too, and the floor is larger than the customary, too. So evenly are the teams matched, in real skill, and so uniform the faults in both squads, that the game was made intensely interesting from the start.

W. L. McNeerney, a Wisconsin coach and athlete, handled the whistle in a very satisfactory manner, observing the clever tricks of the game that are classified as fouls in a way few officials can emulate. He was satisfactory to both teams throughout, call-
