

PLENTY FISH FOR LENTEN

SMELT OF HIGH GRADE ON THE MARKET.

Little Movement in Prices Except in Wheat.

All kinds of fish are to be seen on the La Grande market. Fine quality of smelt from the Cowlitz river, said to be the finest in this section of the country, are on sale at about ten cents per pound. Later on the price will go down as the supply generally increases about two weeks after the annual run of these slender fish.

Live Stock Steady.

There is nothing startling in the markets of the Pacific Northwest nor in any of the markets of the world. Hogs and cattle have experienced little change, and all prices have remained about the same as yesterday. It is not thought there will be any violent fluctuation one way or the other in the price of meats on account of the supply and demand. The lenten season is bound to exercise an effect on the meat market for the next thirty days and nothing short of no shipments at all to the Portland market will force the price above the present figures.

Small shipments of fresh things have come from the California gardens, but it is not likely that much will come by the way of La Grande. Green stuffs continue to come from Walla Walla and Portland and the local greenhouse and the price is just the ordinary winter price.

Wheat Steady Everywhere.

Wheat remained stationary for the day save in the Budapest market which showed a slight falling off, but in all of the other markets of the world the market is strong, and the tendency is to go up. Trade is brisk on the coast and California millers are calling for supplies. This would indicate that the price will be better in the near future. All experts in the grain market predict dollar wheat for the next month. All flour in La Grande has gone up 5 cents per sack or 20 cents per barrel.

ORDINANCE NO. 690, SERIES 1913.

An ordinance declaring the cost of improving Y avenue from the east line of North Fir street to the west line of North Spruce street with macadam; determining the property benefited thereby; levying an assessment thereon to defray the costs and expenses of the improvement; providing for the assessment roll of the same and directing the entry of said assessment in the docket of city liens; providing the time when the same shall become delinquent, and requiring the city recorder to prepare a special assessment roll in accordance with the assessments hereln levied and to collect said assessments.

The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the council has considered the proposed assessment of the property benefited by the improving of Y avenue from the east line of North Fir street to the west line of North Spruce street, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in the manner provided by resolution duly passed the council on the 7th day of August, 1912, to be the sum of \$4506.76 and the property hereafter described is specially benefited by said improvement and the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or parcel thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district and which is so specially benefited by reason of said improvement and which has been equitably apportioned among all the lots, parts of lots or land bounding, fronting on or contiguous to such improvement and within the district created for the purpose of making such improvement to the extent of the benefits to such lots, parts of lots or land, by reason of such improvement and in no case in excess of the benefits, and the amount set opposite the description or number of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land for which said respective parcel is assessed is as follows:

and the recorder of the city of La Grande is hereby directed to prepare a special assessment roll in accordance with the foregoing assessment and enter the said assessment in the docket of the city liens.

Section 2. It is further provided that the assessment roll shall be made and payable immediately after the same is entered in the docket of city liens, and delinquent within ten days thereafter.

Section 3. When the recorder of the city of La Grande shall have completed the special assessment roll in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, he shall without delay, give at least five days' notice in one or more of the newspapers having a general circulation in said city of the time when such assessments may be paid in installments, provided each property owner will make application therefor within ten days from the date of the first publication of said notice, said application to be made under and by virtue of the provisions of Chapter 5, Title 26, L. O. L.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the mayor and publishing in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer.

Passed the common council on the 5th day of February, 1913, by eight councilmen voting therefor.
