the bill introduced by Representative
Schubel of Clackamas attempting to
harmonize the two present laws tax-
ing the use of water for power de-
velopment purposes. Companies that
made filing prior to 1909 are taxed a
very small sum, while those filing
since that date pay a much higher
rate.

An effort is being made by the Bull
Moose party to secure representation
in the primaries in 1914. They have
introduced a bill in the house to pro-
vide steps whereby they may elect
their candidates at the primaries in-
stead of having to nominate them by
the old convention system. They are
also backing a bill which provides
for the election of all national com-
mitteemen by the electors of the state
instead of by the presidential elec-
tors.

Bills have been introduced in the
house that will make several changes
in the election laws, if they go into
effect. Primaries will be held the
third Friday in May every two years.
More time is provided for the print-
ing and distribution of campaign pam-
phlets and the laws generally
smoothed over so that they will work
better.

After a bitter fight that waged for
two hours the sterilization bill of
Representative Lewelling, which was
introduced at the request of the gov-

ernor, ran the gauntlet of the house
and will become a law unless it is
killed in the senate. There was much
opposition to the measure and many
heated speeches were made. The bill
provides for the sterilization of any
habitual criminal or moral pervert.

There is much enthusiasm among
the legislators over the prospects of
developing hundreds of thousands of
horsepower at The Dalles by using
the immense water power of the Co-
lumbia river. Delegations from Ore-
gon and Washington visited the site
Sunday and are anxious to have ap-
propriations made for a detailed sur-
vey. It is estimated that the sur-
vey would cost \$150,000 and that
nearly one million horsepower would
be developed.

There is much speculation around
the capitol concerning the rumor that
Senator Chamberlain is to accept a
portfolio in the cabinet of President
Wilson and that Oswald West will
so manipulate things as to have him-
self appointed senator. It is said that
when Chamberlain resigns, West
would resign as governor thus throw-
ing his job automatically to his
brother-in-law, Ben Olcott, and Ol-
cott would then appoint West to the
U. S. senate. That such a thing
would happen was intimated by Rep-
resentative Hagood, the governor's
mouthpiece in the house, when he
eulogized the democratic party, espe-
cially Chamberlain, West and Lane,
and said that the efforts of the leg-
islature to put West "in a hole"
would redound to his own credit.

The Workmen's Compensation act

passed house when it was presented
in its amended form Wednesday af-
ternoon.

Laborers in the state will receive
their pay every two weeks hereafter
if the senate passes a bill which
went through the house Tuesday. It
provides that railroads, corporations
and other concerns shall pay their
men in negotiable paper, which can
be cashed without discount, every
two weeks.

No Excessive Rates.

San Francisco, Feb. 7.—Restaurant
men of this city have organized for
the purpose of spreading broadcast
the information that visitors to the
Exposition city in 1915 will not be
overcharged.

The new organization is called the
San Francisco Restaurant Men's As-
sociation. The movement has been
organized "not only to assure that
there shall be no exorbitant prices
charged during the Exposition, but
that the cosmopolitan character of
this city's restaurants shall be more
widely known."
