

THE ROSARY WELL LIKED

SPOKANE AUDIENCE EXTREMELY WELL PLEASED

Show at the Steward Tonight Promises Heart Throbs.

Virtue triumphs, true love is rewarded, unhappy hearts are made glad, the villain is not punished, being suddenly reformed, and the curtain descends on universal happiness in true orthodox fashion at the auditorium where a capable company is giving a pleasing presentation of Edward Rose's "The Rosary". At the opening performance last night the heart throbs of the little story brought the tears to many an eye. There were tears of sympathy with the injured wife and tears of joy when the dove of peace returned. At any rate, there were tears, and no one seemed to be ashamed of them.

Has Much of Heart Interest. Following much the motif of the plays of the "Old Homestead" type, "The Rosary" offers an abundance of tense scenes, and the heart interest

and human touch is strong throughout. Music of the andante religious kind is incidental to the movement of the play and tends to create the atmosphere of the supernatural, which

combining the superstitious and the miraculous, is the dominant note in the theme. But apart from its strong denominational appeal, the play has something for everybody, its grip lying in its strong humanity rather than in the creed it exemplifies.

Harrison J. Terry as Father Brian Kelly, ruddy faced, silver-haired, witty, eloquent, kindly, generous and forgiving, is the central figure. He is admirably fitted physically for the part and his deep melodious voice has a forceful ringing quality. As the disseminator of joy and the illuminator of gloom the lovable old priest is in good hands. Dan McGuire as Kenward Wright, the evil influence is the villain of the conventional type, both as to physique and stage manner. George Tripp as Lee Martin, ex-banishment, gets many more laughs from the audience than from his sweetheart with his perennial daffydills. C. DeAdriole as the husband, and Andrew Castle as the lovesick youth handle their parts acceptably.

Jean Ward Pleasing. Jean Ward, who plays the double role of the injured wife and her ill-starred sister, has a pleasing personality and a good speaking voice, and gives a careful delineation of the two characters. Addie Dougherty as Lesara Watkins, the laughless girl from Bellows Falls, and Varborg Ahlgren as the niece of the priest handle their parts creditably.

As a clean pastoral drama with a conventional plot and a happy ending "The Rosary", as presented, leaves a pleasant taste. It will be repeated at a matinee this afternoon and also tonight.—Spokesman-Review.

The hollers and coal bins are far underground. They are on the Evans street side and more strongly protected than a man-of-war. They are at least twenty feet below the surface and surrounded on the top, side and floor with a concrete wall four feet thick.

Supposing our young boring friend got through that wall, when he emerged he would find another just as thick and just as strong. The lower portions of the mine building are divided into compartments. They are separated, each compartment with its own defense.

The thief or thieves would find a real problem to get into the storage vault. He would first have to break through a steel door weighing seven tons. He would then face what is known as the outer vault. The safe in this is 60 by 20 feet and is ten feet high. There are millions of dollars in it.

This safe is girt on every side with a lining of chrome steel. In the corridor within the great vault there are four doors leading into the subvaults. The cells where are located these vaults are barred and netted with steel. There are no less than sixty doors in the storage vault. Each of the eleven minor storage vaults is in a steel girt cage, which has two massive steel gates. One is above, the other below.

The Diebold safe is secured by time locks. On the inner side of an eight inch thick door is a clock, which can be set at night to be opened at any selected time. Until that time arrives not even government employees can get in the ponderous door. Two officials with keys must aid when the clock is ready to let them in.

The guards will visit the storage vaults every few minutes and turn on a flood of lights. Inspectors go about day and night and visit all of the treasure rooms of the building, upstairs and down. Special attention is given to the vaults, but no portion of the building is neglected. Every thirty minutes "A's well" is heard over the private telephone.

All over the building are hidden high power magazine rifles. They are oiled and inspected regularly. It is said that there are at least a hundred of these guns always ready for use. Three years ago \$5,000 was spent in the construction of massive gates leading to the rooms where the money and bullion are stored.

The alarm system is connected with police headquarters. It is said that the Denver mine is the best protected in the world, and no big building has anything better in the way of defense with the exception perhaps of the National City bank of New York. This bank has an elaborate system of steam pipes around its vaults for use against raids. If these valves were released, I would roast every one in the basement of the bank alive.—Denver Post.
