to such county treasurer by the state treasurer, shall be appropriated and paid into and be and become part of the general road fund of such county.

The bill was introduced by Senator Burgess and was read for the first time on January 13.

"This bill is something and isn't anything," said Al Andrews, secretary of the Union county Motor club, today, "and isn't worth the time it took to pass it. What good will the funds do us when everyone has had a whack at them, and such counties as Multnomah take the lion's share after the expenses of the department have been met? The bill will do us little good. Last year the gross expenses for the fund were in the neighborhood of \$41,000 and the net re-

ceipts amounted to about \$30,000. If this money were in the hands of the county treasurer and set aside for the road fund we would always have a fund on hand to make road improvements where they are most needed. This way the money will be in the hands of the state treasurer for the entire year, and the county will be deprived of its use for that period."

The automobile license in this county amounts to about \$1100 and in 1913 will be double that amount.

"If the entire amount could be kept here as a working fund," said an auto owner today, "we might expect to have some very decent roads in the near future. The bill will benefit the big counties and won't enable us to make the repairs and the highways which we contemplated. The bill has not passed the house and we think the delegation which goes from here to argue the bill with the legislature will do some good. If we can win in the house, a substitute may be offered for the senate bill."

"Besides what object is there in sending all of the money to Salem to be handled by an expensive set of clerks only to be turned back to the counties in vastly diminished sums? The thousands of dollars required to collect this money could be saved. All that would be required would be to leave the entire matter with the county clerk, who would furnish the necessary licenses and the tags, collect the money and send the record to some clerk in Salem who might keep a complete record of all licenses. The state might contract for the signs bearing the license number and sell them to the respective counties at cost. This would insure uniformity and the funds would remain in the county from which the application came, where they could be used to immediate advantage."

Visitors Are Optimistic.

President W. N. Sweet of Boise was one of the first to rehearse the situation and pointed out where the great handicaps of last year were successfully overcome and pointed to the fact that a half dozen or more great problems of La Grande's club last year will not exist this year, among them the player situation wherein La Grande had only nine days to make up a team last year; there is a good grand stand and grounds, which the team didn't have last year until the very last, and other similarly important problems of last year are missing this season. L. M. Brown, secretary of the Tri-State league and prominent in the Northwest commercial organizations, dwelt on the need of publicity and the method of obtaining this through baseball, and he also during the evening at various times advanced suggestions as to the best way to finance the team. C. A. Hosler and A. S. Shockley, both prominent Baker fans expressed the earnest desire of Baker to have La Grande in the league, noting "Baker wouldn't get far without having La Grande to buckle up against in athletics."

Floyd Jones, also of Baker was here with the crowd yesterday.

club and though work is necessary to obtain the finances needed, there seemed little question of the ultimate outcome. Nearly 50 business men were in attendance.

Outlook Is Bright.

"This season promises to be one of the most successful that has ever been the lot of organized baseball in the intermountain country. The whole circuit is only 452 miles from Boise to North Yakima, and a club will have five teams to play, starting from either end of the circuit in the short distance of 904 miles, the distance to North Yakima and return. As there are six clubs in the league this year the jumps will be shorter and the amount of train fare and Pullman charges will be greatly lessened. With Baker City in the league, a club traveling out of Boise will have no need to take a Pullman and it will be the same with the other towns. The train schedules are so arranged that a club can make a jump from one town to the other after a game and in plenty of time so that the sleepers will not have to be used."

Population to Draw From.

The combined population of the six towns in the league is close to 90,000 inhabitants. The six counties in which the towns are located have a population of 185,000, and it is thought that the game will be a paying proposition with this population to draw from. Owing to the fact that North Yakima has subscribed over \$2500 at the present time, the league officials will ask that they organize at once and get ready to go in the game.

Control of Umpires.

The only ruling made at the league meeting had to do with the matter of the dismissal of umpires. Heretofore the president of the league had the balance of power over the holders of the indicator, but this year it was agreed that any umpire who was unsatisfactory to four of the six directors should be dismissed. A majority of the board will have the authority over the umpires, and it is thought that a great deal of the quibbling which has heretofore characterized the fans of the different towns will be done away with.

Adopt a New Ball.

The league voted to adopt the Goldsmith ball and the Goldsmith uniforms for the coming season. These balls and uniforms are being used by the Pacific coast, the Northwestern and several other leagues in the western country.
