"THE ROSARY" PROVIDES STUDY THEMES.

A fair sized audience witnessed the presentation of "The Rosary" last night in Steward's opera house. The play was bound to affect people variously because of the denominational character of the play, and because of the extremes of seriousness and foolishness which are enacted under surroundings that are very sacred. The pseudo Father Kelley merited the bulk of the praise for the fine manner in which he acted the trying part of the priest. The leading lady would do better if she were not quite so affected in some of the scenes, by acting the part in an easy, graceful manner. But this may be accounted for by the fact that she impersonates the pure womanly beauty of the role of her twin sister, which causes her to make lightning changes of dress. In some of the more trying scenes she is at her best and plays the part of a wife supposed by her husband to have secret relations with a former admirer, and does it in a very acceptable manner. Bruce Wilton is good, save in the difficult scene in

which an atheistic mind is giving way to faith in a supreme being. Other members of the company are fair.

There are several gripping incidents in the play which hold the attention of the audience. At times the silence was tense. The author lost his sense of proportion in the last scene by mixing frivolity in the persons of the butler and the maid, who appear in on the stage. With the sacredness of a church. There are some other things out of tune but on the whole the effect is wholesome and will leave a vastly better impression than much of the suggestive stuff which parades under the name of drama.

A PAMPERED POET.

Wordsworth Was Waited on Hand and Foot by His Family.

The somewhat doubtful pleasure of a visit to Wordsworth in his home at Rydal Mount, as described by Mrs. Kemble, is thus given by Mrs. L. D. Walford in "Memories of Victorian London."

"It was not a pleasure--the Wordsworths were such queer people and so wrapped up in themselves. Even though you were their guests you were expected in everything to play second fiddle to the man of the house. Round him everything revolved. You might have a poor breakfast, cold dishes, bad coffee--things were mostly bad at Rydal that were only for the inferior general company--but the master's comfort was sedulously attended to--so different from my other poet friend, Mr. Southey, with whom I also stayed at the lakes. Southey was everybody's body, attending to every one, looking after every one himself, while in the Wordsworth household it was the custom for the head of the house to breakfast in bed, wife on one side, daughter on the other, both wholly absorbed in ministering to his wants, while every other person might go hang!

"And it was the same all through the day. You might as a stranger long to see all you could of those beautiful lakes and mountains, and almost any hosts would have taken care that you should, but not so the Wordsworths. If it were a dull day and rain impending there was a chance of his getting wet, and all the pros and cons were debated in your presence, but without any reference to your possible witness. If there were a cold wind they shook their heads with decision; he was never allowed to walk or drive in a cold wind.

"One was fairly sick of it, and I would not have stayed even the three days I did but that I was on my way to Oreta Hall and did not like to incommode the Southneys."
