CATTLE, HOGS ON INCREASE

MARKET NOT OVERCROWDED,
HOWEVER.

Wheat Growers Are Still Holding
Back.

Both cattle and hogs have taken a slight advance and the market is not overcrowded. The Oregon Journal prints in yesterday's issue a story concerning the losses to cattle and sheep in the Idaho country. This will not greatly affect the price because Idaho is not the main shipper to the Portland yards. It would not be at all out of mention to suggest that this might be a good opportunity for farmers of this valley to replenish their herds. Where feed is scarce the farmer is compelled to sell or suffer the loss of all his stock. There is an abundance of it in the

Grande Ronde and it will be some time before spring grass will give the Idaho farmers relief from their present plight.

Wheat Being Held.

Wheat is in great demand but those who have it to sell are holding on for the dollar which is likely to come before very long. Bluestem and Turkey Red are selling on track for 94 and 95 cents. Chicago showed a slight tendency to balk at a higher figure but the tendency from behind is so strong that all efforts to stave off a rise in the price is only delaying the time when wheat will sell for one round dollar.

Eggs Continue Scarce.

In spite of the fact that eggs are worth ten cents more in the La Grande market for the farmer than in any of the towns in the valley, the shortage continues. The corn storage product is gone, or so hopelessly bad as to make it unsaleable, and fresh eggs are all that can be had.

Warm weather is looked for soon and the price will then go down within a few days.
