The report of board of inquiry, covering investigation of head-on collision between trains Nos. 32 and 33, which occurred 400 feet east of east switch at Lostine, at 1:17 p. m., February 4th, 1913, is as follows:

No personal injuries;
Track not protected by block signals;

Damage to equipment \$600.

No. 31 delayed 4 hours between Lostine and La Grande.

Nos. 31 and 32 annulled between Lostine and Joseph.

Committing finds that Engineer F. E. Cook and train No. 33 are responsible for the accident, on account of occupying main line on time of a superior train, in violation of rule No. 89; and without proper flag protection, in violation of rule No. 99.
