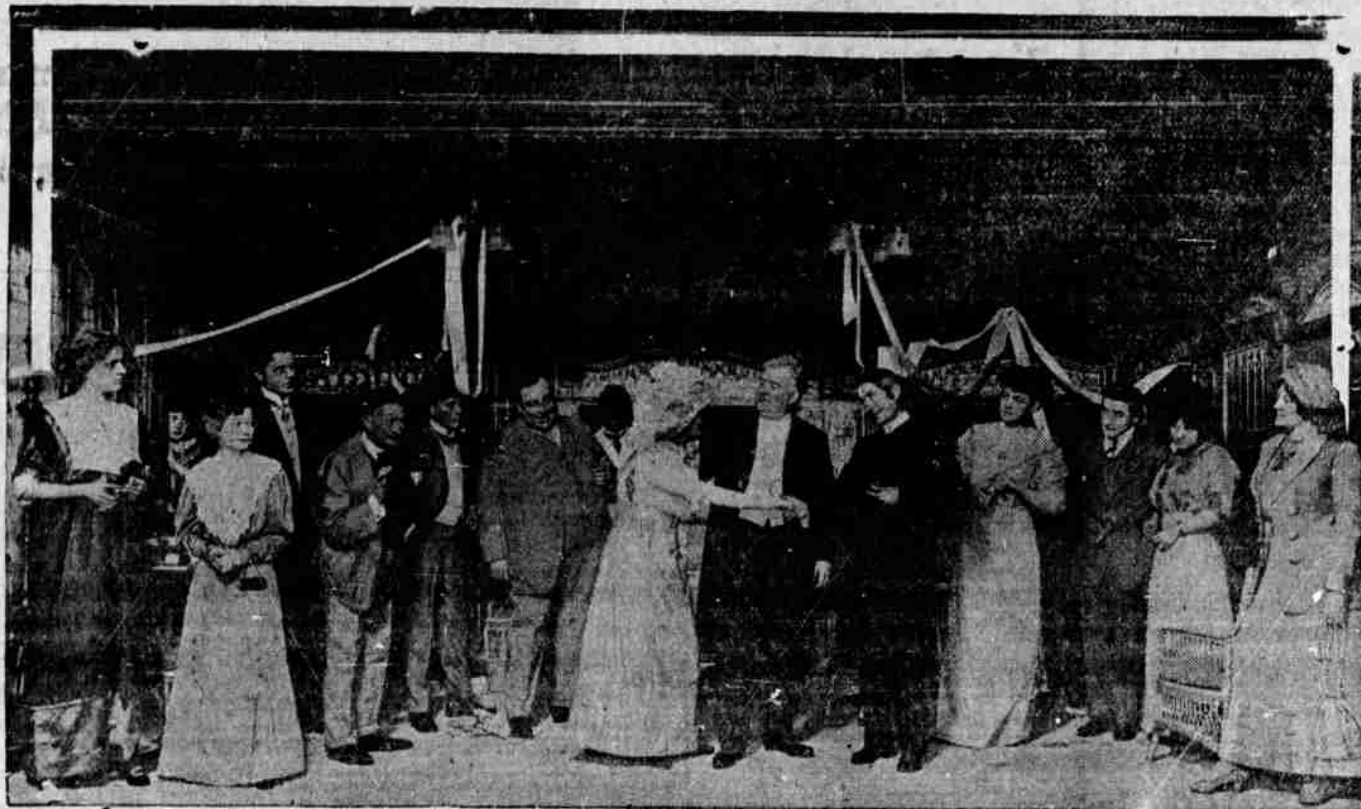

To the city of La Grande Henry W. Savage will send a play February 22 that ranks among the most successful stage offerings this producer of successes has presented. Then there is a young couple who would be on a wedding tour but for the fact that the breaking down of a taxicab has prevented their arriving at the parsonage in time for the marriage ceremony before boarding the train. The fact that friends of the couple believe them to have been married adds to the harrowing nature of their experience. In the score and

half of passengers who are making the journey are numerous other types, each of whom has experiences and troubles of his own, and in addition there is a regulation train crew and a group of Pullman attendants. The three acts of "Excuse Me" so teem with incident that it would be futile to attempt to tell its story. The fact it has proved to be the one really big laughing success will be accepted by local playgoers as sufficient to justify an unusual amount of interest. For the interpretation of the story of "Excuse Me" Mr. Savage has gathered a cast that is really remarkable.
