Mishaps Can't Stop Hog Sleds.

A long string of sleds loaded with hogs reached Enterprise from Paradise and Flora Monday afternoon, after an interesting trip through the deep snow of the north woods. Part of the men, camping in the old barn at Red Fir, nearly got caught under it when it collapsed Sunday night. Another string of sleds was caught the same night on Snow Hollow grade and had to camp there.
The sleds were divided into three groups Sunday evening. The first reached Sled Springs and put up there for the night. The second stopped at Red Fir. Men and horses gathered in the big old barn, the only place out of the deep snow. Fires were made inside and the men spread their blankets and prepared to spend the night there.
Before they had turned in, some one noticed that the walls of the old building seemed to be settling. The supports under the old sills were giving way beneath the strain. The warmth of the room where the hogs was softened up the snow about the walls and they were yielding under the weight of the deep snow on the roof.
Blankets were gathered up and taken outside. The horses were led out. In a few minutes the old barn collapsed. The men in this party were

Miner Stump of Flora, Joe Harris and John West and his small son.

At the same time Dave Kuhn, Walter Enyart, Ira Phillips, William Graham, Clarence and Horace F. Dale were having troubles of their own on the Snow Hollow grade. Phillips' sled upset six times in a mile. Travel was so slow that night came on with the sleds out on the road where the men put in most of the night, with the thermometer barely above zero.

Aside from these incidents the trip was successful. The road was better than had been expected and by the time the last sled had passed over it was in really good condition. Others who came in the party were Albert Wilson, Edward Enyart, Ernest Fisher, Aaron Thomas Harvey Hendrickson and S. R. Cochran. The hogs were bought by George Chandler who shipped them out on Tuesday's train. The north end men started back that day.
