An Historic Graveyard.
The Granary burying ground in Boston was established in 1690. The name was derived from the public granary which stood on the south side of the ground. Here were interred the bodies of eight of the early governors, the victims of the Boston massacre, the parents of Benjamin Franklin, the first mayor of Boston, several revolutionary heroes and many other distinguished citizens and patriots.

Water in Pernambuco.
Water is sold by the ton at Pernambuco, Brazil. It is piped from springs eight miles out from the city and is furnished to ships at 51 cents a ton within the harbor.

Fishhooks.
Fishhooks are no new things. Specimens dating back 3,000 years, obtained from the ancient lake dwellings of Switzerland, are extant.
